Asheville, Sept. 12.—Richmond Pear-son, one of the outstanding figures in state and national politics a score of years ago, diplomat and former con-gressman, died at his home, Richmond Hill, near this city, this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mr. Pearson's condition became criti-cal last week, when it was announced from the beside that the was gradually sinking. He elapsed Into unconscious-ness Monday, and remained in a com-tose condition for almost 48 hours pre-ceding his death.
