"If they come here and try such an unlawful thing, I'll put them there as long as I am in office," he warned. The total tonnage for 1913 was 2,-724,424, and the aggregate for 1923 was 5,292,275. an advance of 3,567,852 is the decade. The number of ships also was much larger, 478 entering in 1913 and 716 making this port in 1923.

The harbor master's report recommended that better and larger facilities be provided here for handling the vessels, in view of the increase and in anticipation of a further growth.
