The following announcement as carried in The Charlotte Observer was of interest here, where Mr. Lowe resided for a number of years:

Dr. and Mrs. Charles A. Bland announce the marriage of their daughter, Mary Terry, to Mr. David Lowe, in Lancaster, S. C., August 10.

No announcement was made of the marriage on account of the serious illness of Mrs. Bland. Mr. and Mrs. Lowe returned last night from Raleigh, where they have been visiting friends for several days, and are at the Bland home in Selwyn Avenue, Myers park.

Mrs. Lowe is the only daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Bland, and is a grand-daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. Y. McAden, on her mother's side, and the late Dr. M. A. Bland and his first wife, on her father's side. She represents two of Charlotte's most influential and prominent old families, and is a brilliant and charming girl.

Mr. Lowe is a son of Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Lowe, of East avenue, the former a leading real estate man and a member of a prominent family in this section, the latter of the McDowell family, one of Mecklenburg's oldest and most historic families.
