Smithfield N. C., Oct. 30.—Calling at tention to North Carolina's record of development in its unparalleled natural resources during the past few years, but regretting the percentage of illiteracy is still high. Angus W. McLean, of Lumberton, formerly director of the War Finance Corporation, this morning delivered an address at the Johnson County Agricultural Fair now in progress here. Mr. McLean opened his address which was devoted for the most part to a discussion of agricultural resources and educational facilities of the state.

In the course of his address the speaker asserted that while North Carolina crops in 1922 averaged \$48 an acre against \$821 in lowa, that the average farmer in North Carolina had not enjoyed the same degree of prosperity as those in lowa because while the gross yield per acre in this state was greater, its met yield was too small. He declared this was caused by not applying general scientific and business principles to farming industry in the state, and urged the farmers to use more businesslike methods. He declared denaction such as the state now furnishes along varied lines, would prove to be of great assistance to those rural dwellers who would take advantage of it and urged genter use of the educational facilities of the commonwealth.
