There will be a third level of slightly smaller dimensions above the museum room and above that an observation level with structure a little smaller in size from which visitors will be able to view the country from the capitol building at Washington, to the Washington homestead at Mount Vernon. Stately colonnades on all four sides of each of these three levels forming the tower-like structure will add to the beauty of the memorial. The architects are Helme & Corbétt, New York, with S. Eugene Osgood, Detroit, as consulting Architect. Olmsted Brothers, Brookline, Mass., are the landscape architects with Carl Rust Parker in association.
