Master Raiford Miller returned yesterday from a Charlotte hospital where he had been undergoing treatment on an eye that was injured about ten days ago. His condition is reported as improved.

No new cases of any kind were reported to the county health department this morning, according to a department report. Several cases are usually reported on Monday, as no reports are received on Saturday afternoon and Sunday.

A quantity of tar, placed in the rear of the new Cabarrus Savings Bank building, caught fire this morning and caused some excitement. The fire created a dense, black smoke, but it was quickly extinguished and none of the adjoining buildings were damaged.

The football players of the Charlotte High School are high school champions of the State this year. The Charlotte team won the honors Saturday by defeating Sanford 20 to 7 before about 5,000 persons at Chapel Hill. Statistics of the game show that Charlotte had the better team.

Spratt Bros., who came to Concord eight months ago and opened a branch store at Buffalo and McGill streets, Forest Hill, are going to move soon into their new store next door to Joe Gaskel's store. They don't want to move their stock and are now offering all goods at one-third off for cash.

Every man in Concord is invited to attend the Father and Son banquet at the Y. M. C. A. on Thursday night of this week. Fathers who have sons are asked to take them. Fathers who have no sons are asked to invite some one else's son. An interesting program has been arranged for the event.

Two cars were badly wrecked near Silver Hill, the negro neighborhood, Saturday night, police officers state. The wreck was reported, but when police officers arrived the occupants of the cars were gone. The officers so far have not learned who owned the cars or who were operating them when the accident occurred.

Thirteen defendants were docketed for trial in records court this morning. Two were charged with assault with a deadly weapon, one was charged with violating a city ordinance, three more were charged with carrying a concealed weapon, four were charged with intoxication and three with gambling. Court was in session for several hours.

The Concord Y basketball team lost its game with the Charlotte Y team Saturday night 62 to 17. It is reported that Mr. Litaker collided with a buggy which he did not see, the child being hurt in the accident and the buggy and car being badly damaged. 16,000 MOTOR DEATHS. TOLL FOR 1923, SEEN

Fatalities Will Take 12 Per Cent. Jump, Insurance Experts Estimate. New York World.

Deaths from automobile accidents in the United States will approximate 16,000 for 1923, said Dr. Harry Toulmin, vice president and medical director of the Penn Mutual Life Insurance Company, yesterday before the Association of Life Insurance Presidents in the Hotel Astor.

He based his prediction on life insurance death claim payments for the first ten months of this year, and estimated that there will be a 12 per cent. increase in the automobile death rate for the year.

Dr. Toulmin found that automobile accidents, influenza and pneumonia were the chief causes of the increased number of deaths. Decreases were noted in typhoid fever, tuberculosis, and cancer and there were fewer suicides reported.

Dr. Toulmin disagreed with the recent British view that the proper gauge of physical condition is a man's ability to work without fatigue and his feeling of "fitness," claiming the only true index is a thorough examination.

Center of Population in State.

(By the Associated Press.) Washington, D. C., Dec. 10.—The exact center of population of North Carolina as determined by the fourteenth census was located in latitude 35 degrees, 36 minutes and 48 seconds north and longitude 79 degrees 31 minutes, and 27 seconds west, according to an announcement made here tonight by the Census Bureau. The exact location of this spot, according to the report, was 3 miles southwest by south of Mount Vernon Springs in Chatham County.

The movement of the center shifted between 1910 and 1920 1.7 miles from point to point while the direction of the movement was 0.7 miles southward and 1.5 miles westward.
