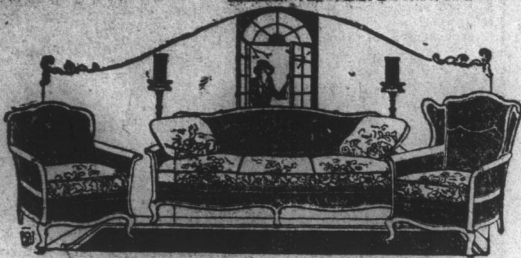


Removal Sale Continued

Mrs. Sus Willis Leaves Part of Estate to Several Institutions in State, Greensboro, Jan. 5.—The Barium Springs Orphanage, which is the North Carolina Presbyterian children's home, Glade Valley School, in Allegheny county, also a Presbyterian institution, and the assembly home missions of the Presbyterian Church in North Carolina are beneficiaries under the will of Sus Willis, who died in Rockingham county in 1922. A copy of the will was filed here today in the office of clerk of superior court, due to some bequests to Guilford county relatives. The orphanage is left one thousand dollars, Glade Valley School five hundred and the home missions assembly the remainder of the estate, the value of which is not yet determined, but known to be considerable.

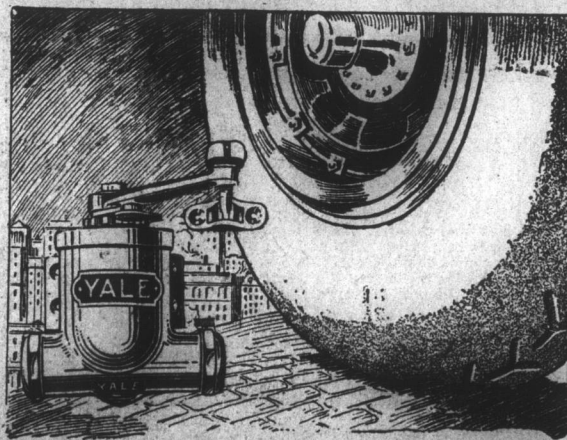
