DR. VAN DYKE REVIEWS MR. WILSON'S CAREER

Points Out Five Great Achievements Which Put Him Among Nation's Greatest Men.

Princeton, N. J., Feb. 3.—Dr. Henry Van Dyke, Princeton university professor, who was one of Woodrow Wilson's closest friends in Princeton and ambassador to the Netherlands during the Wilson administration, said tonight: "Former President Wilson's death, will indeed be a great loss to the nation, but one cannot help thinking of it as a great release to him from the pain of a long, brave and strenuous fight for health. His achievements put him among the great American Presidents. Five of these achievements must be recognized by all fair and reasonable men.

"First, the wise program of national legislation which he carried through on his entrance into the high office, including especially the federal reserve bill, which kept us from panic and financial disaster during emergencies of the war.

"Second, the patience and firmness with which he handled the question of American entry into the war, refusing to go in until it was unavoidable and until he had a united country behind him.

"Third, the vigor and efficiency with which he carried on the war after we were in, including the way in which he handled the great question of a selective draft.

"Fourth, the splendid way in which he made it clear that America's purpose in the war was to promote the cause of liberty and peace in the world as well as to protect her own interests.

"Fifth, the fine courage with which he advocated what seemed to him the best if not the only way of securing a lasting peace among the nations of the earth and the absolute devotion with which he practically laid down his life for that cause. These things will stand to his everlasting credit."

GEORGE C. GOODMAN DIED EARLY SUNDAY MORNING

Had Been Ill For Several Days Following Stroke of Apoplexy—Funeral This Afternoon.

George C. Goodman, one of the largest and most successful farmers in Cabarrus county and a man who was actively identified with all phases of life in the county for many years, died yesterday morning at 4:30 o'clock at his home in No. 3 township. Death was caused by apoplexy, Mr. Goodman having been stricken early Wednesday morning and having grown gradually worse until the end.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at Mt. Olive, conducted by Rev. T. W. Smith. The body left the home at 1 o'clock and after services in the church interment was made.

Mr. Goodman was 78 years of age, having been born in this county on February 28, 1850. He was a son of the late F. S. Goodman, for years a prominent man of this county, and was married on August 6th, 1872, to Miss Mary Walter.

Surviving are the following children, brothers and sisters:
The children are Dr. Andy G. Goodman, of Lenoir; Mrs. A. L. Deal, of Enochville; Mrs. J. Mack Bradford, of this county; and Mason Goodman, of this county. James A. Goodman, Mrs. James A. E. Barnhardt, Mrs. John A. Scott, W. F. Goodman and C. J. Goodman, all of Concord, are the surviving brothers and sisters, and in addition he is survived by his step-mother, Mrs. F. S. Goodman, and one half-brother, F. S. Goodman.

Mr. Goodman was for a number of years a member of Shiloh Church and was keenly interested in its work. He was prominent in politics in the county also, and showed unusual interest in all public matters.

Mr. Goodman's home is one of the handsomest and most convenient in the county. He was a successful farmer and he carried modern methods to his farm and farm home. He was known in every part of the county and his friends were legion.

FUNERAL OF MR. JOHN M. COOK

Held Sunday Afternoon at St. James Lutheran Church.

Funeral services for the late John M. Cook were held on Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from St. James Lutheran Church, conducted by Rev. L. A. Thomsen, the pastor, assisted by Rev. J. L. Morgan, D. D., of Salisbury, president of the North Carolina Lutheran Synod, and Rev. B. S. Brown.

The capacity of St. James Church was taxed by the throngs of friends who had come to pay the last sad tribute to this universally loved man. Floral tributes were banked in profusion about the entire chancel of the church.

After the service at the church, the funeral party proceeded to Mt. Pleasant, where the body was laid to rest in the family plot.

Hundreds of friends of the deceased made the trip to Mt. Pleasant, in a long sorrowing procession of automobiles. Out of town friends and relatives were present in Concord by the scores, and when the cemetery was reached by Mt. Pleasant, hundreds were there who had been unable to attend the services in Concord.
