\$15,000 BAIL IS ORDERED FORFEITED

Court Advised That Means Had Twice Failed to Appear When His Case Was Called in New York.

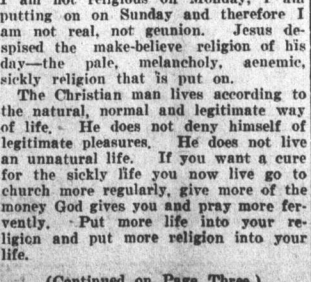
Some Taxes Restored
