**GROUP MEETINGS FOR ALL**  
**THE ALUMNI OF M. P. C. I.**

**Campaign For Funds For Mt. Pleasant**  
**School Will Begin in Concord on Ser-**  
**vices of This Month.**

Group meetings in the interest of the financial campaign for Mt. Pleasant College Institute have been planned for various parts of the State, and it is announced the meeting in Concord will be held on the night of April 7th at St. James Lutheran Church at 8 o'clock.

Rev. B. A. Barringer chairman of the campaign committee, will preside at the meeting here and talks will be made by Mr. Barringer, Prof. J. B. Robertson, Rev. L. A. Thomas and Rev. M. L. Keeter.

Mr. Barringer expects much from the 150 alumni of the school in Cabarrus county, he declares in a letter sent to them. And the alumni are expecting success from Mr. Barringer's efforts. He was head of two European appeals conducted by the N. C. Lutheran Synod and raised about \$18,000. He was also head of the Lenoir College campaign last year.

Mr. Barringer will remain in Concord from the seventh to the fifteenth in the interest of the campaign.

In his letter sent to alumni Mr. Barringer says:

"All men who are former students of graduates of the school at Mt. Pleasant and who live in or near these towns where group meetings will be held, are urged to come together at these places. A number of speakers will be on hand. Do not miss these meetings. Come and see all your old school mates again. Come prepared to get a message to think about. The success of this cause largely depends on the whole-hearted response of the men who attended the school. The public and the church are waiting for what response we shall make—if it is good then all will go well. It must not be anything else.

"Additional group meetings will be held in Mt. Pleasant, Kannapolis, Salisbury, Winston-Salem, Mooresville, and possibly other points. Dates of such meetings will be announced later.

**ALDERMEN DECLARE ALL**  
**DOGS MUST BE VACCINATED**

**Pass Law Requiring Persons to Keep**  
**Dogs Shut Up Until They Have Been**  
**Given Rabies Vaccine.**

Passage of an ordinance requiring all dogs in the city to be vaccinated against rabies was the most important action taken by the aldermen at their April meeting Thursday night. Another ordinance regarding driving across the grass plot on Marsh street also was passed.

The dog ordinance becomes effective at once. It is aimed at stray dogs that make their homes on the streets of the city and become a nuisance to everyone.

Under the law all dogs must be vaccinated within 30 days and until they are vaccinated they must be kept at home. Dogs found on the streets will be killed unless they carry on their collars a vaccine tag.

A mad dog bit a number of dogs here recently and this case was taken as an example by persons who sponsored the bill. The dog was not worth a dollar, it was pointed out, but he bit one man and several valuable dogs. Hereafter such dogs would be killed as soon as seen or reported to a policeman.

The other ordinance passed makes it a misdemeanor to drive across the grass plot on Marsh street. The plot was planned to add beauty to the new high school plant and heretofore many persons have driven across it very carelessly, thus destroying part of its beauty.

The aldermen will meet again April 10th, and at that time some definite action in regard to allowing the American Legion to operate a pool room will be taken. Legionnaires presented a petition to the aldermen Thursday asking for permission to open a public pool room and the matter will be decided at the call meeting.

**Mad Dog Ordinance**

Owing to the large number of mad dogs running at large and to protect the school children and citizens from rabies, and to save the people from spending large sums of money and suffering the pain of taking the Pasteur treatment, be it therefore resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord:

Section 1. That from the publication of this Ordinance and until November 1st, 1924, it shall be unlawful for any dog to run at large within the corporate limits of the City of Concord, or within one mile of said City limits, unless such dog shall wear a tag issued under authority of law showing that such dog has been vaccinated for rabies.

Sec. 2. Any owner of any person having under his control any dog, which shall permit his dog to run at large in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined Twenty-Five Dollars or imprisoned fifteen days, and any dog so found running at large not wearing the necessary tag showing that it has been properly vaccinated, will be killed by any policeman of the City.

This February 3, 1924.  
 Dr. T. N. Spencer or any other veterinary surgeon or medical doctor can administer the rabies vaccine, and when your dog is vaccinated the doctor will furnish the owner with a card properly filled out and signed and will also furnish the tag to be placed on the collar of the dog.
