Cleveland, April 14.—The Republic national convention here in June sit directly over many ropes of 110 a 220 volt cables which will carry to sit directly over many ropes of 110 and 220 volt cables which will carry to the country the news of what the delegates are doing while they are doing it. These cables, hidden by the false floor on which the Republicans will be seated, will rest on the ceiling of the press rooms below. They will rise to the ceiling from incessantly ticking instru-ments on, telegraph tables, through chambers in the columns which support the convention arena. News will be rushed to the telegraphers by way of a specially constructed state from the press gallery. At first representatives of telegraph companies and press associations thought it would be a vexing problem to lay their wires. Their concern chang-ed to joy when they learned that the 50 supporting columns already con-tained electrical switches and com-pariments adaptable to telegraphic fix-tures.
