J. F. Hurley Will Make Address—Exercises To Be Held in New High School Building.

Officers of the Dadson-Ramsour Chapter, Daughters of the Confederacy, who are making plans for the observance in Concord of Memorial Day, stated this morning that the occasion this year will be observed on Friday, May 9th, instead of May 10th, the usual date.

The change in the date is made so that all of the school children of the city can attend the exercises. The schools are in recess on Saturday and for that reason it would be difficult to get the children together.

The exercises this year will be held at the new High School building and will begin promptly at 2 o'clock. Heretofore the exercises have been held at the Confederate monument on the court house lawn. The school children probably will hold appropriate exercises during the day but they are not expected to attend the exercises at the schoolhouse during the indoor session.

J. F. Hurley, editor of The Salisbury Post, and one of the most pleasing speakers in the State, has been secured to deliver the address this year. Mr. Hurley is a former Concord citizen and he is certain to be heard here with much interest.

The daughters are anxious for every Confederate Veteran in the county to attend the exercises. The Veterans are asked to be at the school building not later than 2 o'clock.

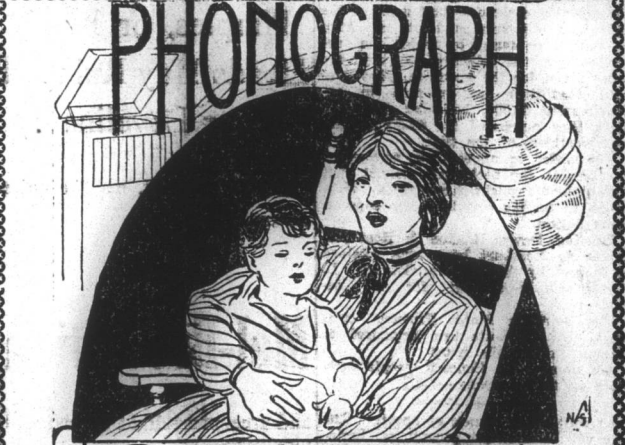

BAND OF ROBBERS IS CAUGHT IN HICKORY

Alleged to Have Police Records in Various Towns in the State.—Ten Are in Jail.

Hickory, May 6.—A gang of alleged robbers who have given work to police officials throughout the state, were captured in this city tonight by the Hickory police force, assisted by officers from Lenoir.

The band, 10 in number, has a police record it is alleged, in Winston-Salem, Cramerton, Lenoir, Hickory and other cities where they have made wholesale raids on dry goods and clothing stores, making its get away in stolen automobiles. Part of the \$1,000 worth of good stolen from the Brookford mill store in this city and a number of shirts stolen from a Belk store at Cramerton were recovered tonight.

Two of the leaders, Albert Shook, and Ernest Parker, the last to be caught, were sleeping in a house in West Hickory when Lenoir policemen, given the trail by Rhodhiss officers, arrested and brought them to Hickory jail.

The Rhodhiss officers attempted to arrest Parker and Shook last night but they escaped after a scuffle. The two men who are about 20 years old have confessed to a number of robberies.

Other members who are believed to belong to the same gang are in the county jail in Newton. The names of those suspected in connection with the Brookford robbery are: Leroy Cook, Ernest Parker, Albert Shook, Charles Kayle, Jessie Smith, Merion Smith, Durant Buff and Melvin Couch. Several of them give Brookford and Rhodhiss as their homes.
