Clyde Ivey, 13-year-old negro boy charged with the death of his father, Ernest Ivey, has been bound over to Superior Court. The juvenile court held that it had no jurisdiction in the case and for that reason the youth will be held in jail until the next term of Cabarrus Superior Court.

The board of trustees for educational institutions of the N. C. Lutheran Synod is meeting in Mt. Pleasant today. This board has supervision over both of the schools at Mt. semi-monthly report on farm notes. The general opinion seems to be that the weather has been recently favorable in most farming districts the report says.

"Planting is well advanced and several counties in the Southern section of the state report that all planting is completed," Mr. Parker stated. "Work seems to be about normal in many Piedmont counties, though it has been slow on account of the late season. The most frequent remark made by our reporters all over the state was that general farm work is from ten to 15 days late. Crops are growing fine."

"The past week has been too cold in North Carolina for cotton, and as a result, the market has shown a marked rise in prices. Cotton is just coming up. However, many farmers in the northern section of the cotton belt say that they are just planting. With the increased acreage, we are expecting a good crop in spite of the boll weevil."

"Tobacco planters are making headway transplanting. Plants are said to be small and some farmers in the Central Coastal counties state that plants are scarce but, in the state as a whole, they are reported as plentiful."

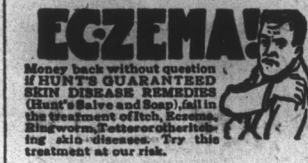
