CARTER SENTENCED TO DEATH FOR WIFE-MURDER

Collapsed When Verdict Was Announced and Had to Have Attention of Physicians.

Reidsville, May 17.—W. Austin Carter, on trial at Wentworth for wife murder, was found guilty of murder in the first degree by a Rockingham county jury at 11:20 o'clock tonight, and was immediately sentenced to die by electrocution on September 20th. Attorneys for the defense are considering an appeal, but no announcement of their decision had been made tonight.




