FATHER OF YOUTHS WILL NOT ATTEMPT TO DEFEAT JUSTICE

Leopoid and Lock to Get Only Such Defense As They Are Entitled to. Chicago, Jûne, 6.—Their millions will not be used to save Nathan Leopoid, Jr., and Richard Loch, confessed slayers of Robert Franks, from the gallows, a Joint statement issued tonight by the fathers of the accused youths, both Chicago millionaires, said.

"Only such defense as that to which every human being is entitled will be provided for thir sons," the statement said. "Assuming that the facts in this case are substantially as published, then the only proceeding they favor is simple, solemn investigation under the law, touching the mental responsibility of their accused sons."

There will be no legal counsel outside the attorney now representing the accused, with one possible exception, the statement said, and no large sums will be spent for either legal or medical talent and "in no event will the families of the accused boys use money in any attempt to defeat justice."
