Wheat's Sudden Boom.

July wheat on May 7th had fallen in the Chicago market by nearly the full amount of the increased tariff of 12 cents a bushel imposed by the Coolidge administration to save the market and hold the farmer vote. Its closing quotation was \$1.06 3-8. By June 6th the quotation was off to \$1.04 3-8. By Monday, June 9th, as the Republican clans were starting for Cleveland, it was down to \$1.04 1-4.

The Republican national convention opened next day and wheat shot up to \$1.08 1-4. Coolidge and Dawes were nominated two days later and wheat continued on up. It now ranges from \$1.13 to \$1.15 1-2 for July.

The official explanation is that crop damage discoveries developed on the eve of the Cleveland gathering which had not been detected before although a thousand crop agencies had been combing the fields all along. What is the official and actual explanation? Is there anything to the story floating around of a pool to boost wheat and with it corn and other staples? How could a little money be made to go so far for Republican campaign purposes?
