Western North Carolina to Ship Its Apples to England.

Asheville, Aug. 3.—Efforts are now being made to have western North Carolina apple growers make the first shipment of that fruit to England this year. This is the plain as set forth by the Farmers' federation here. The officials for this organization have expressed the belief that they can succeed in getting a belief that they can succeed in getting a shipment to London 10 days before the Virginia producers can get their crop to

shipment to London 10 mays betwee the Sirpinia producers can get their crop to the ports.

James K. McClure, federation executive said that it would greatly enchance the value of the Carolina apple crop and their standing in the future, if western North arolina producers could beat the Virginians to LoCudon with their apples. It was pointed out by the executive that in addition to this standing and rating of the future that it would relieve the market and give the orchardists immediate money. He added that the apple crop in England this year is reported to be 75 per cent short, making room for a large marketing place.

At least 50 car londs on the water and headed for England by the later part of August, is the plan now proposed as explained by the officials. The prices on export apples will remain high until October, is the expossed prophecy of the officials. This means they say, that if the federation succeeds in getting the apples in large quantities to the market by the end of August, there will be big prices for them.
