ROCKY RIVER BRIDGE IS PROMALLY OPENED

Large Crowd of People in Stanley County For Celebration—Picnic Dinner and Speeches.

Albemarle, Sept. 4.—A large number of Albemarle people attended today the celebration of the opening of a handsome concrete bridge which spans Rocky River on State highway route No. 27, located midway between Albemarle and Charlotte in the southern part of Cabarrus county. The dedication crowd which is estimated to number around 2,500, was made up about equally of people from Stanley, Cabarrus and Mecklenburg.

A picnic dinner was enjoyed by the large crowd. Before the dinner there was a program of speeches. Morrison Caldwell, of Concord, acted as master of ceremony and among those who made short addresses were Senator J. M. Boyett, of Albemarle; W. C. Wilkinson, of Charlotte; Senator L. T. Hartsell, of Concord; W. L. Mason, of Albemarle; Major W. A. Foll, of Concord; W. M. Lefler, contractor, of Albemarle; J. B. Prigden, engineer, of Charlotte; D. E. Henderson, of Charlotte, and Jake Newell, of Charlotte.

This handsome concrete structure completes the bridging of all streams on the Raleigh-Albemarle-Charlotte State highway and brings the city of Charlotte within 161 miles of the state capital. The highway between Albemarle and Charlotte is now being covered with hard surface for about two-thirds of the way. There is hard surface from Charlotte to near the Mecklenburg line and it is hoped and expected that the 1925 State highway program will include the completion of a hard surface road all the way from Albemarle to Charlotte.

NO PROSPECT OF JOINT DEBATE IN NORTH CAROLINA

Democratic Dawson Quietly Chloroforms Proposal—To Wage Active Campaign.

Brook Barkley in Charlotte Observer, Raleigh, Sept. 4.—Democratic State Chairman John G. Dawson quietly chloroformed joint debate talk today by refusing to take it seriously, and in an afternoon conference with Angus Wilton McLean, the Meekins' challenge had no place in the consideration of campaign plans.

The Democratic nominee spent the day in Raleigh. To newspaper inquires he explained that his agreeableness to the proposal of his Republican opponent for a joint discussion was merely a personal attitude. Acceptance is a matter of party policy, and therefore, not for individual determination.

All that Mr. McLean and Chairman Dawson have heard of the challenge has been in the newspapers. The chairman will hardly pay any attention to its until or unless Colonel Meekins makes personal delivery. And then, it is expected, he will make one of his political statements declining to supply Democratic audiences for the Republican candidate.

Mr. McLean talked over general campaign plans with Mr. Dawson and other party leaders today. He expects to start soon on a speaking tour that will take him into every section of the state.

"I am going to wage an active campaign," said he, "but not quite so active as my primary campaign. I shall not make five speeches a day, as I did then, nor undertake to keep on the go with three hours of sleep a night."

Watch Those Dodging Brooklyn Dodgers.

New York, Sept. 4.—Wilbert Robinson's Brooklyn Dodgers stretched their consecutive winning streak to 13 games today by taking a doubleheader from the Boston Braves. The Dodgers, who pulled up to within three points of the leading New York Giants, who lost a decision to Fletcher's Phillies. McKechnie's Pirates also slumped a bit and gave ground to the Dodgers, Brooklyn easing into second place ahead of the Pirates.

The race in the National League is one of the most interesting in years. The three teams are all within one game of one another but the Dodgers due to their sensational spurt, appear to have the call on their opponents unless the Giants and Pirates recover from their slump.

Stanley Harris' Washington Senators gained a full game on the Yankees today by defeating Boston while the Yankees lost to Mack's Athletics. The Senators now are two full games ahead of the Yankees and playing better baseball than their metropolitan rivals.
