

DAVIS IN MARYLAND ON SWING THROUGH THE BORDER STATES

Nominee Makes Personal Appeal to Maryland Voters—Two Addresses Scheduled There For the Day.

FREDERICK IS HIS FIRST STOP

And Tonight He Will Go On to Baltimore Where He Will Address Thousands in Regimental Armory.

(By the Associated Press.) Baltimore, Oct. 1.—John W. Davis, Democratic nominee for President, will make his personal appeal to the voters of Maryland today.

Mr. Davis will reach Frederick shortly after noon. There he will be entertained at luncheon by the United Democratic Women of Maryland before he speaks at the mass meeting.

More than 80 chairs have been placed in the armory but it is said that 20,000 people can be accommodated.

TWO REPUBLICANS TO SUPPORT MR. DAVIS

President Hibben and Dr. W. C. Thompson Swing to Democratic Nominee.

Washington, Sept. 29.—The Democratic National Committee announced last night that Dr. John Grier Hibben, president of Princeton University, and Dr. William C. Thompson, president of Ohio State University, had made it known that they would support John W. Davis for the Presidency.

Dr. Hibben, the committee pointed out, was one of the 31 prominent Republicans who signed the appeal in 1920 for support of the Harding ticket as a means of bringing about American participation in peace problems.

Kills His Business Rival in Synagogue. Los Angeles, Calif., Sept. 29.—While nearly 100 horrified worshippers looked on, Solomon Ostraw, 35, walked into the Zion synagogue during Jewish festival services here today and shot and killed his business enemy, Harry Denny, 55, and wounded a man and a woman in the struggle that followed among members of the congregation for possession of the gun.

In jail he said the slaying was the result of business trouble between him and Denny but refused to divulge its nature.

Present Fate of Martin Bost Rests With Judge

Judge Shaw to Determine Whether Or Not Slayer of Jesse Vanderburg Will Be Freed on Bond Now.

HEARING HELD IN CHARLOTTE

Bost Tells Story of Shooting, Declaring He Was Defending Himself—Mrs. Vanderburg Gives Statement.

Martin Bost took the stand in his own defense at the habeas corpus hearing in Charlotte Tuesday afternoon before Judge Thomas Shaw, the hearing having been sought by counsel for Bost as a means of securing his bail.

The testimony of Bost, Mrs. Vanderburg, Sheriff Caldwell, Ed. Biggers and Dr. I. A. Yow was given special attention not only by Judge Shaw but by counsel.

That, according to Bost in his testimony at the hearing, was his reason for shooting. He and Vanderburg had been together the night before the shooting.

Vanderburg left the house then, Bost said, and in a few minutes he saw him coming toward the porch with an axe in hand.

Asked if he took any of the wine Bost replied that he took just a swallow to show Vanderburg that he was not mad with him, as the latter had charged when Bost refused to drink at all.

The prosecution during cross-examination asked Bost if he shot Vanderburg in some words near his home and the defendant replied "no."

Bost also declared that to him it appeared the axe dropped over Vanderburg's shoulder after he shot and he denied that he touched the axe after the shooting.

Bost said when he saw Vanderburg coming with the axe he picked up a pistol off of table in dining room where he kept it most of the time.

Bost admitted on cross-examination that his wife and children left him about (Continued on Page Five)

Irish "Rabbis" and 5,000,000 Jews In Chicago, Wine Permits Indicate

Chicago, Sept. 29.—Federal agents, searching for reasons for the excessive use of "sacramental wine" in Chicago, have discovered that many of the "rabbis" signing withdrawal permits have Irish names, and that the franchises issued to "congregations" indicate a Jewish population exceeding 5,000,000 in Chicago alone.

Erubing still further, the Federal agents discovered that the business of furnishing "sacramental" wine was so profitable that it permitted the paying of \$95,000 a week in graft.

Applicants for permission to withdraw and sell "sacramental" wine were informed they would have a stand on "inspection." This involved a fee of \$300.

Not Much Water Damage Is Reported in Rowan

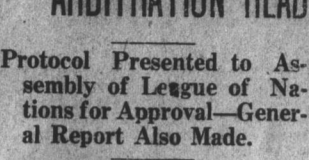
Salisbury, Sept. 30.—Salisbury along with the rest of this section of the country suffered from heavy rains during the past few days though no one reports any special amount of damage.

BAPTISTS TO COMPLETE 75-MILLION CAMPAIGN

Will Go at Gigantic Undertaking Without Pessimistic Note Being Sounded.

Raleigh, Sept. 30.—At the call of Secretary Charles E. Mundry, who is the executive head of the Baptist mission steering committee of the 75 million campaign, together with all the heads of departments of the board of missions, met in this city Monday to outline the plan of operations in finishing up the 75 million campaign this fall and at the same time to launch the new program for 1925.

The committee found itself confronted with the gigantic task of raising between now and December 31 a million and a half dollars to complete the 75 million campaign, and the 1925 program of North Carolina Baptists calls for the raising of a million dollars in the face of such a large undertaking not a pessimistic note was sounded.
