SUDDEN DEATH HERE OF VISITING BAND MEMBER

W. C. Watson of Wisconsin Band Died Suddenly Last Night While Attending Barbecue.

W. C. Watson, member of the Wisconsin Band which is furnishing music for the Cabarrus County Fair here this week, died suddenly last night while attending a barbecue given at a country home near Concord. He had been in usual health and death was caused by acute indigestion.

Members of the band, horse-men who have racers at the fair, fair officials and other persons were guests at the barbecue which was planned and arranged by fair officials for the benefit of their fair week guests. Mr. Watson is believed to have become ill after eating heartily of the food and as his body was found under a tree near the house where the food was served, he is believed to have walked to the tree to get fresh air. It is not known just when Mr. Watson walked from the house but friends missed him in a short while and a search carried them to his body.

Mr. Watson was about 30 years of age and was married. He leaves a wife and several children besides other close relatives.

The body was brought to the funeral parlors of the Bell & Harris Co., where it remained until this morning when it was carried to Albemarle, the home of the deceased. Funeral services will be held there.

Mr. Watson was a cornet player in the band and was one of the best musicians in the outfit.

FUNERAL OF F. DAVIS BRUMLEY TOMORROW

Services Will Be Held at Poplar Tent Presbyterian Church Tomorrow Morning at 11 o'clock.

Franklin Davis Brumley was 63 years of age, having been born in Cabarrus county June 23, 1861. He was a son of the late William D. Brumley, who was fatally wounded during the War Between the States. Mr. Brumley was twice married, his first wife being Miss Eugenia Lips and his second wife Miss Mary C. Aultew. To the first union six children were born and to the second union five children were born. The surviving children are Mrs. Thomas W. Stewart, of Huntersville, Mrs. Joe E. Michael, of Harmony, Mrs. J. G. Rodon, of Cleveland, Ohio; A. W. Brumley, of Concord; W. D. Brumley, of No. 2 town-ship; F. E. Brumley, of Mooresville; Miss Janie Ruby Lee and Susie B. Brumley and Charles Britt Brumley. Mrs. Brumley also survives.

Mr. Brumley was born and reared in this county and had been a life-long member of the Poplar Tent Church. He was always actively interested in all public matters affecting his county and was recognized as one of the most prominent and successful farmers in the county.

Mr. Brumley died yesterday morning at 9 o'clock at the Poplar Tent, where he had gone on business. He was in his usual health when he left his home, which is located near the gin, and death was caused by heart trouble.

Important New Mail Facilities

Of general interest to the public is the fact that Concord is now for the first time in the history of the local postoffice using pre-cancel stamps on second, third, and fourth class mail matter, thereby enabling a much quicker dispatch of this class of mail. Permits holders by the use of pre-cancel postage can mail packages after the post office closes by placing same in a large receptacle which Postmaster Ward will soon install at the main entrance of the post office.

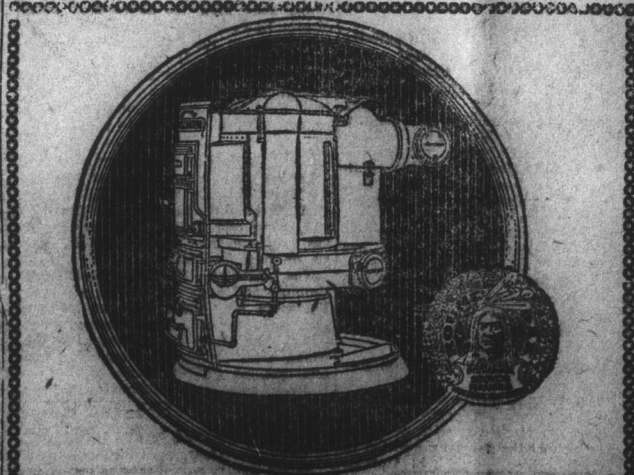
