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COOLIDGE SCORED ON LAW ENFORCEMENT

Nation-Wide Scandal in Regard to Dry Law Still Exists, Undermeyer Says.
Washington, Oct. 22.—A statement declaring a "nation-wide scandal" in regard to prohibition enforcement, "still exists" and that President Coolidge "has proved he will not put an end" to it, was issued here tonight by Samuel Undermeyer, New York attorney.

The letter from Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, assistant attorney general in charge of prohibition enforcement, to the law enforcement league of Philadelphia last July on the enforcement question and the league's reply were quoted by Mr. Undermeyer in drawing the conclusion that the President has "used his power to prevent the people from learning the facts."
