

COMPLETE RETURNS FOR COUNTY MADE HERE DURING DAY

Canvass of Vote Shows Referendums and Amendments All Carried in Cabarrus in Election Tuesday

NO BIG CHANGE FROM FIRST VOTE

Lowest Democratic Majority Was 928 the Official Vote Shows—Majority for Ports and Ship Was 512.

Complete official returns from Tuesday's election show no major changes in the totals carried in Wednesday's Tribune. The official count shows that every Democratic candidate received a majority in the county, with L. V. Elliott having the largest majority.

The judges and registrars met this morning at 10 o'clock in the office of C. A. Fenhour, chairman of the county board of elections. The canvass of the county was made there and the results are entered in the table published elsewhere in this paper.

It was impossible to tell Tuesday night and yesterday what majorities some of the candidates had rolled up in Cabarrus. The full vote on the county ticket was reported Tuesday night but the vote on other candidates was lacking. The same was true in regard to the amendments. The vote on these was not known until the official canvass was made today.

The vote for county officers, with the office of cotton weigher as an average, shows the following gains and losses by the Democrats over two years ago:

- No. 1 Township—Gain 4 votes. No. 2 Township, box 1—Loss 3 votes. No. 2 Township, box 2—Gain 68 votes. No. 2 Township, box 3—Loss 22 votes. No. 3 Township—Loss 2 votes. Ward One, box 1—Gain 85 votes. Ward One, box 2—Gain 6 votes. Ward Two—Loss 14 votes. Ward Three—Gain 30 votes. Ward Four—Gain 90 votes. Ward 5—Loss 10 votes. Total loss, 151. Total gain, 795. Net gain 644.

In the county the Democrats made their biggest gains at the Hartsell Mill, Brown Mill and Kannapolis. In the city their biggest gain was in Ward Four. The change in the vote at Kannapolis is very unusual. Four years ago a Republican majority was polled there and this year the Democrats had a majority there of about 500. Elliott's majority there, as a matter of fact, was more than 500.

Cabarrus county acted favorably on the ship and port bill, giving the measure a majority of 512. The vote was: For 2,957; against 1545.

Vote on the other amendments, all of which were carried, was as follows: For Veterans' Loan 2268; Against 374. For increased pay for Legislators: 2023; against 673.

For limiting State debt 1575; against 108. For homestead tax exemption 2109; against 233.

For establishing sinking fund 1370; against 194.

The complete returns showed one important change, that affecting the total vote received by Major W. A. Foil. The official vote increased his majority from 913 to 928.

THE COTTON MARKET

Opened Steady at Decline of 7 to 23 Points—Market Soon Turned Upward. (By the Associated Press.) New York, Nov. 6.—The cotton market opened steady at a decline of 7 to 23 points because of relatively easy Liverpool cables and a private report pointing to a crop of 13,000,000 bales. Considerable Liverpool and Southern selling was absorbed by covering and bid buying, and the market soon turned upward, January advancing from 23.01 to 23.36 in the first hour. The outlook for a cold wave in the southwest probably contributed to the advance, but the chief factor appeared to be the optimistic view of trade prospects and reports that spinners were buying on the decline.

REPUBLICANS GET BEST OF UPSETS IN NEW CONGRESS

Make Net Gain of Sixteen Seats in House and Three in Senate. (By the Associated Press.) New York, Nov. 5.—Belated returns gave the Republicans the best of it today in the upsets in both the House and Senate. But it appeared that final returns from all districts would be necessary before there could be a determination whether President Coolidge could expect a real working majority in the next Congress.

\$20,000,000 WORTH OF STATE BONDS FOR SALE

Money Will Retire Notes Due in December and February, It Is Explained. (By the Associated Press.) Raleigh, Nov. 6.—State treasurer Ben Lacy today was authorized by the council of state which met with Governor Morrison in the executive offices, to advertise for bids on \$20,000,000 worth of bonds to be let at an interest rate not to exceed 4 3/4 per cent. It was announced at the treasurer's office. The bids will be opened November 25 next.

Rowan County Loss Well Liked Citizens

Salisbury, Nov. 5.—J. Albert Miller, aged 70, a very influential and well-liked citizen of Daire county, died suddenly at his home near Cherry Hill church, early today.

Johnson Behind

In Minnesota, Representative T. D. Schall, Republican, had what his supporters regarded as a commanding lead over Senator Magnus Johnson, Farmer-labor, Johnson still insisted, however, that missing rural precincts would return him a winner.

Smith Is Winner in Hot New York Race

New York, Nov. 5.—Coolidge and Davies swept the Empire State in the election yesterday, on the basis of incomplete returns, by a plurality of approximately \$20,000, but Governor Alfred E. Smith, Democrat, demonstrated his personal popularity by winning the gubernatorial nomination over Theodore Roosevelt, Republican, by a plurality of approximately 113,000.

World Fliers Hop Off Again

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 6.—Headed by Lieutenant Lowell Smith, the trio of world fliers left Fort Bliss and winged toward the southeast today at 7:25 a. m. The airmen had a strong wind at their backs and expected to make San Antonio within seven hours.

Senator Brookhart Leading Now

Des Moines, Iowa, Nov. 6.—Senator Smith W. Brookhart was 645 votes ahead of Daniel F. Steck, his Democratic opponent in the senatorial contest at noon today, when a score of Iowa county election boards had re-checked the returns.

Will Be Candidate for Speaker of House

Washington, Nov. 6.—Representative Martin B. Madden, republican of Illinois, announced today that he would be a candidate for speaker of the House to succeed Frederick H. Gillett, who has been elected to the Senate in Massachusetts.

FATE OF PORT AND SHIP BILL IS NOT KNOWN AT PRESENT

Unofficial Vote on Measure From 683 Precincts Shows 68,773 Votes For and 74,081 Votes Against It.

Official Returns Will Show Result

Some Changes in Counties in the State in Local Offices—Catawba County Is Republican Once More.

(By the Associated Press.) Raleigh, Nov. 6.—Official canvass in the various counties throughout North Carolina was eagerly awaited today by persons interested in the fate of the port terminal development bill. Failure of election officials in many precincts to count the vote for this measure on Tuesday night, due to long county and state ballots, and the multiplicity of questions to be voted upon, has resulted in slow returns on this, as well as the veteran land fund measure, and four constitutional amendments.

The unofficial vote on the ports measure had been received here up to this morning from only 683 out of the state's 1,730 precincts. This gave for the bill 68,773; and against 74,081, or a majority of 5,308 against the measure.

General Albert Cox, who directed the campaign in behalf of the measure, and others at campaign headquarters, still declined to admit defeat, declaring that they believe that when the vote was finally tabulated they would win out by about 10,000 votes.

Opponents were claiming his defeat by approximately the same margin. In very event, the vote undoubtedly will be far closer than that in any of the other questions laid before the voters for decision.

With the Democratic State and presidential tickets apparently elected by a wide margin, interest in these races centered today in the size of the popular vote and the margin by which the successful candidates were elected. Scarcely any returns have been received from the mountain counties of the western section of the state, and a number of the counties along the seacoast have not yet reported on any races.

Scattering returns from legislative districts throughout the state indicate that the political complexion of a number of districts has been changed, the Republicans probably having increased their representation in the House of Representatives. For the first time since its formation in 1892, the thirty-third State senatorial district went Democratic, Harry Baker, Democrat, having been elected to succeed the late Rufus Haymore.

Catawba county, after being Democratic for two years, returned to the Republican column, and for the first time in 32 years the Republicans gained control of Johnston county. Dan Lucas, of Benson, and Walter Batten, of Micro, were elected to represent Johnston in the House of Representatives.

Stanly Is Democratic. Albemarle, Nov. 6.—The unofficial, but practically complete returns in Stanly county show that R. N. Furr, running as low man on the Democratic ticket, has defeated J. J. Morton, present incumbent, by 266 majority. R. L. Brown, attorney, of Albemarle, was elected to the House of Representatives over his Republican opponent by 387 majority.

Majorities for other Democratic county officers and for Congress range between 275 and 400 majority.

The vote in Stanly county was practically the same as it was two years ago.

Two Hundred Autos Destroyed by Fire. (By the Associated Press.) Bradford, Pa., Nov. 6.—The Star garage and about 200 automobiles were destroyed by fire today with a loss of \$250,000. The fire started on the second floor of the three-story garage building, after an explosion, and within a few minutes was beyond control.

CONGRESS MAKE UP NOT SETTLED IN DEFINITE WAY YET

However, It Appears Likely That the Republicans Will Have Working Majority in the House.

MANY DISTRICTS YET IN DOUBT

It Is Known Now That 230 Seats Will Be Held by Persons Favorable to the Coolidge Policies.

New York, Nov. 6 (By the Associated Press).—The Republican triumph in Tuesday's election assumes an even greater magnitude as the counting of the ballots nears completion.

Overnight returns not only boosted the total of electoral votes credited to Coolidge and Davies, but increased the likelihood that the new administration will have a dependable majority of its own party in Congress.

They likewise lifted to new heights the vast Republican majorities in several states already counted in the Coolidge electoral column and gave indications of depositing there all of the electoral strength now classified as doubtful.

The latest triumphal processions are Montana and Nevada, having between them 7 votes in the electoral college. That would increase the party total to 374, or 108 more than is needed to elect.

The electoral bag of Davis and Bryan remained meagre at 136, and apparently the only chance of an increase was in New Mexico, where the Democratic ticket was holding the lead by only a scant plurality. Coolidge was gaining at a ratio which if maintained would add the state's three votes also to the Republican total.

LaFollette's last opportunity to increase the electoral vote of 13 given by Wisconsin seemingly hinged on the returns from the only other state remaining on the doubtful list—North Dakota—with five votes. Coolidge remained in the lead on the face of returns from two-thirds of the state, but his plurality was diminishing as a mounting LaFollette vote came in from the country districts.

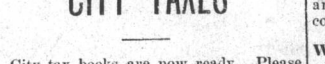
