Six defendants were scheduled to be tried in recorder's court this afternoon, police officers reported this morning. 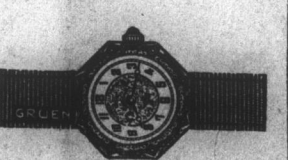
