An early morning service will be held in St. James Lutheran Church Thursday morning at 6 o'clock and at 9:30 o'clock special services will be held in. All Saints Episcopal Church.

At 11 o'clock a union service for most of the downtown churches will be held in the First Baptist Church. Special Thanksgiving music has been arranged for this service and the others.

All of the business houses in the city will be closed for the day with the exception of the drug stores which will be opened for a short time in the morning and afternoon.

Turkey dinners will be staged all over the city and many persons will spend several hours, delecting the good things that will be served with the noble birds.
