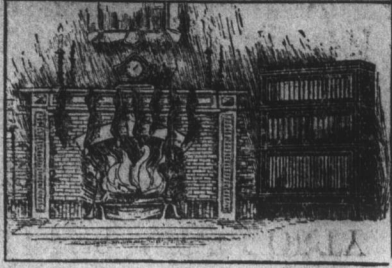

Sweden Takes No Chances With Careless Pilots.

Stockholm, Nov. 29.—The extraordinary strictness of government control of commercial automobile traffic, including motor trucks, motor buses, and jitneys, is revealed by a report from a supervisor of public roads in the province of Stockholm.

The supervision applies to the condition and equipment of the car, its operation, the personal responsibility of the driver, and regularity in the conduct of business. Every passenger must be provided with a ticket, and every driver is subject to inspection in order to avoid counterfeits.

The drivers must not only be sober and provided with licenses and traffic permits but must also exhibit surety papers or other guarantees that any fines or damages assessed on the car can actually be collected.
