INJUNCTION HEARING

Calhoun Men Sought Right to Dispose of Their Cotton Crops.

In a hearing before Judge A. M. Stack in Charlotte Monday afternoon, the case of the North Carolina Cotton Growers' Association against J. D. H. Isehour, M. F. Teeter and E. C. Litaker, all of this county, was brought up and an effort made to remove the injunctions against the three men was successful in one case, that of T. C. Litaker.

All three of the defendants had been enjoined against selling the 1924 crop of cotton and were seeking to have the restrictions removed.

By common consent of both sides, the case of Mr. Teeter was continued. However, the cases of Isehour and Litaker were heard.

Although Isehour claimed that he had rented the land for one-third of the value of the crop and that therefore had no crop to sell, Judge Stack ruled that this had been done after the contract with the Cotton Growers' Association had been signed and that it was therefore not valid.

Litaker brought out that he had never signed a contract with the association and that therefore should not have to sell his crop through it. The court sustained him in this and the injunction was removed.

Representing Litaker in Charlotte was Attorney John M. Oglesby. T. D. Maness, of the firm of Maness and Sherrin, appeared for Isehour. L. T. Hartsell, Sr., of the firm of Hartsell and Hartsell, and John M. Oglesby were attorneys for Teeter.

George Eliot's Husband Dies.

John Walter Cross, second husband of the famous novelist, George Eliot, nee Marian Evans, died recently in London at the age of 84. Cross was a banker, and during the Civil War lived in the United States. He became a friend of the novelist and her husband, George Henry Lewes, in 1860. After the death of Lewes he became more attached to the famous authoress, and in 1880 persuaded her to marry him, though he was 20 years younger than she. George Eliot lived only a few months after the marriage.

"Women who smoke will die young," is the warning of a noted American physician. On the same day this statement was made Mrs. Cassandra Stein, of York, Pa., died at the age of 101.
