SICKNESS DETAINS GASTON MEANS AT MOTHER'S HOME

(Continued From Page One) ago from his home in Washington and with the members of his family has been here practically all of the time since his arrival.

New York, Jan. 5.—Gaston B. Means, former department of justice agent, failed to appear in court today to stand trial on a charge of conspiring to obstruct justice and Federal Judge Lindley ordered the issuance of a bench warrant for his arrest. He held in abeyance the forfeiture of a \$10,000 bail bond pending investigation of a claim that Means was compelled by sickness to remain at Concord, N. C.

Thomas B. Forder and Elmer W. Jarnecke, co-defendants with Means, were present. Jarnecke, former secretary to Means, charged his plea to guilt. It is understood that he would be a witness for the government.

Means, Forder, his attorney and Jarnecke were jointly indicted by the United States grand jury for alleged bribery on accusations made by members of the defunct Altoona Glass Casket Company that the trio accepted \$65,000 to bribe Attorney General Daugherty, United States Attorney William Hayward, and other government officials in connection with the fraudulent sale of stock of the trio.

The bench warrant for Means was issued on application of Special Assistant Attorney General Hiram C. Todd after he had produced a telegram from Dr. Joe A. Bartell, of Concord, N. C., stating that Means was ill and that an operation might be necessary. Mr. Todd said government operatives said Thursday that Means was in good health and that the case had already been postponed too often.

Adjournment was taken until tomorrow morning. Mr. Todd stated that a department of justice agent from Charlotte, was en route to investigate Means' condition. A representative of the bonding company also left today for Concord.

SUPERIOR COURT

Number of Cases Disposed of on First Day of Court.

The first day of the January term of Superior Court, Monday, was taken for the greater part with cases which had been left over from the October term of court.

Martin Best, charged with the murder of Jesse Vandenberg and sentenced to seven years in the State Penitentiary, filed an appeal to the Supreme Court.

H. W. Crawford, resident of the Hartwell Mill and provider for a wife and ten children, was fined \$300 for operating a car while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Judge Shaw stated in passing the sentence that a man who operated a car while under the influence of liquor was a public menace and should be punished very severely. Crawford had a slight accident while driving the car, it was brought out in the evidence, when he ran into another car, doing an \$8 damage.

For possessing beer, Lee Johnson was fined \$100 and confined to the county jail for a period of six months.

John Ensley, for resisting an officer, was given 60 days in jail with a suspended sentence provided he maintain good behavior for a period of three years.
