SEVERAL INJURED WHEN AUTO STRIKES BIG BUS Mitchell, Driver of Touring Car, Admits He Was Exceeding the Speed Limit. High Point, Jan. 9.—A. G. Martin, of this city, was badly hurt and two other persons sustained minor injuries, when a Ford touring car crashed into a high powered motor bus here late today. The touring car turned over and was completely demolished. Martin, who sustained a broken collar bone and several cuts on the head and leg, was taken to the Guilford General Hospital. Dr. T. M. Stanton, the attending physician, said Martin would probably recover unless complications developed. The injured man is a son of J. E. Martin, of Walnut Cove. He is employed by a local furniture manufacturing concern. R. L. Wyatt, driver of the bus, sustained a deep cut on the hand and arm, but was not seriously injured. C. M. Griffith, of Thomasville, suffered a cut on the face, but after receiving treatment at the High Point Hospital, he returned to his home. The two other passengers in the bus, Mrs. W. S. Clinard, of this city, and a white man from Salisbury, whose name was not given to the driver, were uninjured. S. T. Mitchell, of High Point, was driving the touring car, and Martin was with him on the front seat. Mitchell admitted that he was exceeding the speed limit when the accident occurred. He said he did not see the bus until he was only a few feet from the corner. The driver of the bus, operated by the Piedmont Stage line, said Mitchell did not stop his car at the street intersection, as required by a city ordinance. Passengers in the bus said the driver of the touring car was responsible for the accident. Rats Eat \$10,000 Ticket. Madrid, Jan. 10.—A Barcelona laborer, who bought a ticket in a Spanish lottery, hid it in a pump. The ticket was drawn for a prize of \$10,000, but when the laborer went to get it, he found that it had been eaten by rats. He collected the remaining pieces and stuck them together, and may get his money after all.
