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PULLMAN TAX ATTACK LAUNCHED IN SENATE

Reputation of Proposal by Commerce Board for Retention Urged

Washington, D. C., Feb. 10.—Reputation by Congress of recommendations by the Interstate Commerce Commission for retention of the Pullman surcharge was urged in the Senate today by Senator Smith, Democrat, South Carolina, chairman of the Interstate Commerce Committee.

Senator Smith asked the Senate to order the commission's recommendations set aside through an amendment to be attached to some pending bill.


This course, he said, would get the question into conference with the House without the necessity of waiting on that chamber to act on a bill ordering elimination of the surcharge, which the Senate passed at the last session.

Senator Smith described the 50 per cent. surcharge as "unusual and, in my opinion, unlawful," and asserted that yesterday's report of the Interstate Commerce Commission upholding the rate was "unfair and unjust to the laymen."

Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, joined in denunciation of the report, and insisted if the bill passed at the last session by the Senate could be gotten to a vote in the House it would pass "verwhelmingly."
