**KIWANIS HAVE MOST INTERESTING MEETING**  
Dr. T. R. Lewis Makes Good Talk.—No. 9 Road Endorsed.  
A splendid address by Dr. T. R. Lewis, president of Scotia Women's College, and endorsement of the proposition to build a first class highway through No. 9 township featured the meeting on Friday of the Kiwanis Club which met at the Y. M. C. A.

The road matter was presented by Kiwanian Clarence Barrie, who presented a petition which is being signed by citizens of the county in the section through which the proposed highway would run, and by citizens of the city of Concord. It sets out the fact that the state highway from Albemarle to Charlotte goes through that part of the county, but that the people there have no ready access to the Concord market. As a consequence, much of the trade which naturally would come to Concord would be lost to this city unless the road is built.

As drawn, the petition asks that the Highway Board of Cabarrus County open up the proposed road to run from Concord, through No. 9 township, and connecting with the Albemarle-Charlotte highway at Locust. The petition received the signatures of all the Kiwanians who had not yet signed it, and the Club then adopted resolutions approving the building of the road.

Ed Leonard, program chairman, then introduced Dr. T. R. Lewis, who spoke on the observance of law, basing his talk on the passage of Scripture "Let every soul be subject to the powers that be." Power, he declared, is derived only from God, who giveth all power, and those who are in places of power are there through the will of God. Therefore, those who are over us should receive the obedience that is rightfully due.

Disregard for law is one of the most serious problems our nation is facing today, continued the speaker. This disregard for the less important laws leads gradually to the violation of the more important ones, and it is the duty of our citizens today to observe every law strictly, not only for the present good, but also because of the fact that the boys of our nation are looking to the present generation as a pattern for their lives.
