JACK CODY SPENDS NIGHT IN CONCORD

Cousin of Buffalo Bill Making Tour of Country on \$10,000 Bet.

Jack Cody, alleged cousin of "Buffalo Bill" and said to be the last of that famous line, arrived in Concord late Thursday evening, spent the night here and left at 8 o'clock for Salisbury which is his next stop.

Cody is traveling on a bet. It seems that the sportsmen's clubs of Washington that they could not produce a man who could make the cross-country trip from Washington state to Washington city travelling in all 10,000 miles. Cody was found and although almost eighty, he ventured the trip. At the present he is 300 miles from his destination and has 42 days in which to make the journey which will give him ample time to get to Washington, he thinks.

The trip thus far has carried him through Oregon, down the Pacific coast, on into Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, Nebraska, Iowa and then dropping further south into Oklahoma, Arkansas, Tennessee, Georgia and South Carolina. He is now making a bee-line for Washington through North Carolina and Virginia.

Though an aged man, being nearly 81, he is a very robust specimen and walks with the long, swinging tread which one expects of a westerner. He is tall and has a flowing white beard. His conversation is of a typical far-west brogue. Despite the fact that he has money of his own, being the possessor of over 5,000 acres of land, he is forced to get his food as best he may on this trip. At times he has some trouble getting sufficient food and as a result his health is not what it was when he started.

Eight other men tried the trip and failed before Cody made his attempt. He is now nearing the end of his journey and will get the \$10,000 reward when he arrives in Washington. On this trip he has worn out one horse, 17 years of age, which was the colt of a 30-year-old mare he has at home. Last week this animal became lame in Gaffney, S. C., and the people of that place presented him with another because he was unable to purchase a new one. They also gave him \$7, and he spent \$8 of this in Gastonia having rubber shoes put on his nag.

The wagon he rides in is a very heavy, light, one-horse affair. It is equipped with a bed which takes up practically all the interior. Under the bed is a space to keep his cooking utensils and spare clothing and any food which he might happen to have. The covering to his wagon is of heavy oil cloth, the outside of which is painted with the names of the towns and cities through which he has passed.

Cody was born at Cody, near Yellowstone Park, in Wyoming but moved to Washington state some fifty years ago. He has never married, stating that he had never had time to fool with women.

Baptist Rally.

During the present season, this team has experienced an unusual amount of success, downing a number of opponents and holding others which were expected to win easily, to very close scores.

The Y wrestlers had a match with Carolina earlier in the season at Chapel Hill but were late getting there due to a breakdown and the match had been called off by that time. For that reason it cannot be forecast with any degree of accuracy the manner in which Denny's men will hold the University. However, Denny is expecting great things from his team on this occasion. He believes that they are in the best condition they have been since he took them over and is hoping that he can show fans some tight matches tonight.

In addition to the wrestling matches there will be two games of basketball and a girls' gymnasium exhibition. The program starts at 7:30.
