MARINE CORPS LEAGUE ORGANIZED IN CHARLOTTE

Local Men Asked to Join.—Organization Affiliated With American Legion. Representatives of "The Marine Corps League," an organization of soldiers who were members of the Marines during the World War, were in Concord Tuesday afternoon to see persons who were eligible for joining the Corps, relative to affiliating themselves to this organization.

The Marine Corps League is a branch body of the American Legion. Its membership is also associated with the Legion. The chapter in Charlotte was only organized on Friday, the 13th of February. Since that time it has had only one meeting.

It was thought wise to expand and in order to make the necessary expansion it was decided to make a canvass of the towns neighboring Charlotte and get members. Due to the fact that membership is limited to Marines, there was little possibility that an organization could be effected in any of these towns. Therefore Concord and Gastonia Marines were asked to join. Any marine is asked to get in touch with the Adjutant at Charlotte as soon as possible and join the organization.

The officers elected at the recent meeting of The Marine Corps are G. W. Dooly, commandant; and D. W. Blankenship, adjutant. Plans are now underway to have what was termed as a "blowout" at an early date, to which all members will be invited.

PROMINENT PREACHER TO BE IN KANNAPOLIS

Dr. Lingle, Noted Divine, to Conduct a Series of Meetings in Towel City. An announcement of much interest to Concord people and especially to Concord Presbyterians was made several days ago. The announcement was to the effect that the Rev. Walter L. Lingle, president of the Training School at Richmond, Va., and noted Presbyterian divine, is to conduct a series of meetings at the First Presbyterian Church at Kannapolis.

The meetings will begin on March 15 and will be continued through the 20th of that month.

Dr. Lingle is a very noted preacher. He held, prior to his present position as President of the Training School, the Chair of Church History in Union Seminary at Richmond. Previous to this he was pastor in the First Presbyterian Churches of Rock Hill and Atlanta. He is well known in Concord, where he conducted a meeting years ago. Perhaps the highest honor which Dr. Lingle has had conferred on him was his choice as Moderator of the General Assembly of the Southern Presbyterian Church. This is the highest office which the Presbyterian Church can give to its ministers.

Kannapolis is considered fortunate in getting Dr. Lingle and numbers of local church-people are planning to attend the meetings.

Through negotiations conducted by the Indiana Industrial Board it is proposed to transfer thousands of idle cal miners of southwestern Indiana to the steel mills of South Chicago for permanent employment.

DALLAS DENTIST AND GIRL OF GASTONIA ARE ARRESTED

Dr. A. V. Boyles and Miss Ora Hicks Arrested.—Fined \$5,000 Dope Cache. Charlotte Observer, 25th.

Dr. A. V. Boyles, Dallas dentist, and Miss Ora Hicks, of Gastonia, yesterday were entangled in the meshes of the far-flung net of federal narcotic agents who have been busy in this section for a month and who arrested 21 people Saturday night and Sunday and added another to the number Monday.

Search of the home of Ora Hicks at 512 East Airline Street, Gastonia, disclosed a supply of morphine, worth \$2,000 at normal prices, and five hypodermic syringes, the narcotic agents reported.

Dr. Boyles was arrested in his automobile in the act of selling a \$20 container of morphine, officers allege, stating that the drug, 20 cubes, was in a can labeled "Bisodol" and the can was in a small child's sock. They report finding other cans with the same label at Dr. Boyles' home. His automobile was confiscated.

Officers are working on the belief that Ora Hicks was the "plant" and that her home had been the storeroom. They report that she confessed she had been distributing narcotics under the direction of someone else, to Charlotte, Greensboro and to several other points over the state.

When Dr. Boyles was arrested, the federal agents report, they found on his person a letter from his brother, Dr. F. M. Boyles, in New York, which they think throws additional light on the activities. Dr. F. M. Boyles, out on bond to appear to answer a similar offense, is supposed to be taking a course of study in New York.

"Boston Baked Beans"

In his letter, they say "Boston Baked Beans" are quoted at \$50 a can; Dr. A. V. Boyles is told to send a man to New York and the railroad and Pullman fare are quoted; he is informed that at present this is the best way the writer knows to deliver the "beans," and at a later date a better arrangement may be made; when the letter is quoted as stating, Dr. Taylor comes "we will get a room at Times Square hotel at \$10 a day." Officers believe each of the statements has a special significance.

Ora Hicks and her mother were at home at the time the search warrant was served. While the search was being made, the officers say, every effort was made to steer them away from the hiding place of the main supply. Some was found under the pillow of the bed in which the women were sitting. The large supply was found in a tin bucket secreted under an old sack.

The federal officials say that rumors were current in Charlotte ten days ago that Dr. F. V. Taylor, arrested Sunday, had gotten thirty ounces of morphine and that as a result of this, it could be bought at a lower rate. It is alleged that every purchase of morphine made from addicts by the officers in Charlotte last week was of discolored morphine. A small amount of the morphine found at the Hicks' home was recognized as of the same brand as is alleged.

The bulk of the drug found in the Hicks place was in tin cans which held 90 cubes each. It is said that one of the officers present at the arrest of "Gold Tooth" Tommy Mason in Baltimore last Friday that the morphine found at the Hicks place is recognizable as of the same stock. Mason's supply came from New York.

Post and Flagg's Cotton Letter.

New York, Feb. 24.—The outstanding feature of today's market was the heavy tenders of March notices amounting to almost 150,000 bales. An active demand from spot houses for March at about 38 points under May and rather general buying on the belief that the rains in the southwest over the holidays were insufficient gave a strong tone to the entire list. After the first hour during which time business was extremely active the market quieted down but held very steady. Spot advices continue to be very bullish and reports from both local and foreign dry goods centers are encouraging although business in the New England states is still rather unsatisfactory.
