WATSON TRIAL CREATING MUCH INTEREST IN CITY

Number of Concord People Went to Charlotte Yesterday to Hear Evidence in Trial.

Although he is being tried in Charlotte the trial of Thomas I. Watson for the shooting of Joseph E. McDonough is creating unusual interest in Concord due to the fact that Mrs. Watson is alleged to have met McDonough here shortly before the shooting occurred in a Charlotte hotel.

The trial started yesterday and all evidence was offered during the afternoon. Argument by counsel started this morning.

Watson was the chief witness at the trial and reports from Charlotte declare he made an excellent witness. Several times during his examination and cross examination Watson broke down while telling of the associations of his wife with McDonough.

Watson testified that he questioned his wife once, was told she had not been unfaithful to him and that he left home satisfied. While at Birmingham detectives held him his wife was with McDonough and he came back to Charlotte in time to find them at the hotel. He did not intend to kill McDonough, he said, until he got in the room and saw the man there with his wife who was only partially clad.

The court room was packed during the trial of the case, the crowd being so big that lawyers and witnesses had difficulty in finding standing room in the court room.

MAY REMEDY DEFECT IN SOLDIER LOAN ACT

Supreme Court Holds It Invalid, But Constitutionality Not Involved.

Raleigh, Feb. 25.—Supreme Court invalidation of the soldier's loan act carried in the November referendum does not mean that the court's reversal of Judge Daniels' today overthrows the law on constitutional grounds.

The court has not yet written any opinion. Chief Justice Hoke holds that the Grist act is invalid because it was not adopted by a majority of the qualified voters as the law requires. Justice Clarkson dissents.

Correction of this weakness is possibly within the power of the present general assembly, though that would furnish the Supreme Court with a much more interesting question than the one settled. No constitutional point is involved in the reversal of today. The court holds that Judge Daniels' should have sustained the demurrer in Patterson against Everett et al.

The general assembly will probably attempt to cure this disability by a statute either introduced anew or by validation of the referendum. There is nothing in the proposal to issue \$2,000,000 bonds requiring a referendum.

Mrs. Rosa Austin Dead at Home in Number Ten Township

Mrs. Rosa Austin, 90 years of age, died at the home of her son, M. H. Austin last night after an illness of less than a week. Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at 2 o'clock at Howell's church, Rev. M. D. L. Presslar officiating.

Mrs. Austin was a native of Union County, having been born and reared there. All of the early part of her married life was spent in that county. It has only been during the last fifteen years that she moved to Cabarrus county to make her home with her son in No. 10 Township.

Death was caused by an attack of flu, which was followed by complications resulting in pneumonia. Mrs. Austin was the daughter of Pleasant and Elizabeth Gaddy of Union county. Her brothers and sisters have moved West and relatives are unable to communicate with them.

Surviving are two sons, M. H. Austin, of No. 10 township, and J. W. Austin, of New London. There are five grandchildren.

Small Fire at Buffalo Mill Wednesday

A small fire at the Buffalo Mill, caused by spontaneous combustion of waste on the lower floor of the mill, brought out practically all the fire-fighting equipment of the central station yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock.

Very little damage was done due to the prompt work of the firemen. It was thought for a time that a serious fire might result from the blaze and 15 lines of hose were laid to the mill. However, the fire soon was gotten under control and the majority of the lines were not used.

One of the firemen, Zeb Cruise, had the misfortune to lose a watch while fighting the fire. The watch was a new one, having been purchased only a few days previously.


