ANTI-NARCOTIC DRIVE
PUSHED AT CHARLOTTE

Government Agent Says His Men Will Clean Up Peddlers in the State.

Charlotte, Feb. 25.—The government's drive against peddlers of narcotics in Charlotte and vicinity, which has resulted in the arrest of 24 men and women since Saturday night, will continue until the traffic here has been wiped out, according to Dr. B. R. Blakes, of Washington, who is personally directing the work.

Further arrests are expected by the government agents, who, however, refuse to divulge the name of the others under suspicion.

The federal operatives today said they believe with the arrest of Dr. F. V. Taylor, of Stanley Creek, and Dr. M. F. Boyles, of Dallas, Gaston county, they have secured the ring-leaders in an organization that has literally flooded this section with cocaine and morphine, in violation of the Harrison anti-narcotic law.

Preliminary hearings in the cases against these under arrest were being continued today and probably will not be completed until the latter part of the week. All of those thus far given a hearing have been bound over to the next term of federal court.
