WOLWORTH TO OPEN STORE IN CONCORD

Five and Ten Cent Store to Occupy the Store Now Used by Browns—Will Open June 1st.

Another new store is coming to Concord. This latest addition to Concord's mercantile family is to be a Wolworth five and ten cent store.

Wolworth is to occupy the store which at the present is being used by the Brown Clothing Co. The building is to be enlarged and remodeled so as to make it a modern and spacious room. The present building is to be extended to the rear for a distance of about thirty feet, practically doubling the capacity of the building.

Not only will the new addition be built to the rear of the store, but the present store will be built out on one side to take in the ground which is directly behind the Lineberger Shoe Shop.

The work is to begin at an early date and will be ready for the Wolworth company to occupy by the first of June.

Wolworth is a nationally known store. It has branches over the entire country, keeping a high grade of five, ten and twenty-five cent articles. The only other store of this class in Concord is the McClelland Five and Ten Cent Store.

The store building which Wolworth is to occupy is owned by Mrs. W. W. Stringfellow, of Anniston, Ala., who before marriage was Miss Nan Cannon, of this city.

REV. J. C. ROWAN MADE DOCTOR OF DIVINITY

Honorary Degree Conferred on Popular Concord Pastor by Davidson College.

Although not officially announced yet, it was learned Friday that at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of Davidson College held February 25th at Davidson College, Rev. J. C. Rowan, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of this city, was made a Doctor of Divinity. It is likely that the official announcement will not be made until commencement.

Dr. Rowan, who has been pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Concord for over two years, came here from Columbus, Miss. Prior to that time he was pastor of a church in Camden, S. C.

He was born near Carthage, N. C., and was educated at Davidson College. His theological work was done at the Columbia Theological Seminary at Columbia, S. C.

Dr. Rowan, during the time he has been pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Concord, has made for himself a reputation as one of the best preachers in the city and is popular not only with members of his own congregation but also with members of the other congregations. His numerous friends will be delighted to learn of the honorary degree which has been granted to him.

This is the last number of the season, and bids fair to be the best.—Adv.

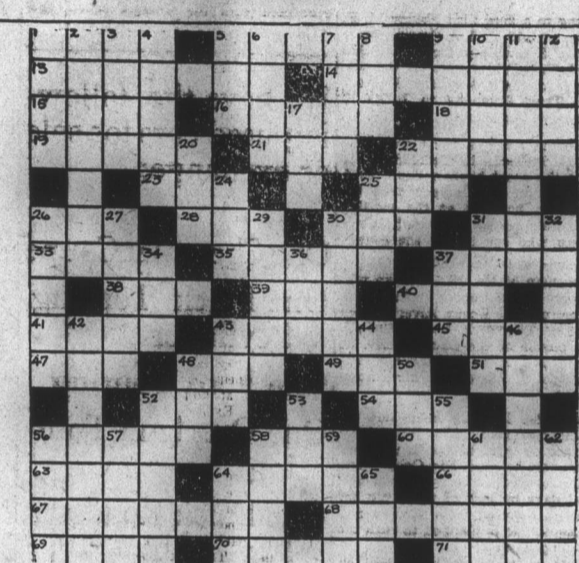

ARTISTS OF RALEIGH STAND BY BORGNUM

Will Give Their Support to the Sculptor in His Fight With the Georgia Folks. Raleigh, March 5.—Raleigh artists will go the limit to see Gutzon Borgnum through and without-reserves when they meet tomorrow night they will give their support to the famous sculptor in his fight with the Georgia folks. The Raleigh group will meet tomorrow evening for the purpose of declaring themselves with Mr. Borgnum. Tonight Mrs. Dixie Washington Leach, wood, of Raleigh, a noted artist and designer of a beautiful Lee memorial, spoke her mind and that of her associates in the world of beauty in an interview with the Daily News representative in which she said: "What the artists of the south are wishing for and looking forward to is the finished memorial to our Confederate heroes at Stone Mountain as conceived in the brain of Gutzon Borgnum—and when finished will be the result of his genius. We care not for his mode of procedure of his preliminary work, which is only the means to the end. And in our opinion as artists any drawing or models he may have made are absolutely his own property and we feel that any other viewpoint of any man or body of men is presumptuous and an insult to genius. No self-respecting artist would be willing to use the models of another or attempt to curry out another's conception of such a stupendous undertaking as this at Stone Mountain. Truly stone cutters and sculptors must of necessity be employed to do the preliminary work, but it takes the artist's hand for the creation of a real work of art. And this is only in the mind of Gutzon Borgnum. "He has been directed from the real work in hand designing a model for the children of the Confederacy, making designs for half dollar to be minted. He has been sent hither and thither soliciting funds and making speeches. No artists can concentrate under these conditions and we feel that too much has been brought upon Borgnum and we are heart and soul with him."

Gastonia, March 6.—Thomas May, 21, a patient in a local hospital, died late last night from injuries received when he jumped from a window of the hospital to concrete steps below. He was a convict who was shot in the abdomen while attempting to escape from the crain gang.

May had apparently awaited a chance to escape the eye of his nurse all day. She gave him his early supper and he jumped from the room just as she had left. He had made several requests for a knife yesterday. Funeral services were being arranged this afternoon. His father, Charles May, was here recently from Whitmire, S. C. The son had been away from home eleven months, his whereabouts unknown to his home folks. He was served a food sentence of eighteen months on the county chain gang. Guard Ellington was forced to shoot him when he attempted to escape by running. He had broken one of his leg chains. He was given every care and attention possible by the county commissioners. He had a special nurse.
