Veteran Minister Preaches Powerful Sermon Concluding Week of Prayer For Missionary Society.

W. E. GRAHAM ROBINSON DEAD AT CHARLOTTE HOME

Formerly a Resident of Concord—Took Leading Part in Textile and Social Circles of Charlotte.

W. E. Graham Robinson prominent in textile and civic circles of Charlotte, died Sunday morning at 8:30 o'clock at the Charlotte sanatorium.

He had been in poor health since Christmas and was taken to the hospital three days prior to his death, which was caused by nephritis.

The funeral service will be conducted at 4 o'clock this afternoon at the home, 805 East Boulevard, by Dr. Albert Sidney Johnson, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church who will be assisted by Dr. W. H. Prater, president of Queens College.

Burial will be at Oaklawn cemetery. Among the active pall bearers will be P. B. Fetter, A. G. Odell and J. Archie Cannon, of Concord.

Mr. Robinson lived in Concord for a number of years, his father being superintendent of the Cannon Mills here. He is survived by his widow, a five-year-old daughter, Mary Graham Robinson; two sisters, Mrs. Elsie H. Shields, of Greensboro, and Mrs. P. C. Gregory, of Harrisville, S. C.

The Charlotte Observer has the following in regard to Mr. Robinson: "His many activities, genial disposition and pleasing personality made Graham Robinson among the best known and liked men of Charlotte. He was ever in the vanguard with those interested in the progress of the city and this section and he never failed when called upon to shoulder his part of the responsibilities and pull with his associates."

As a member of the First Presbyterian Church, president of the Fellowship club of that church, a Mason, member of the Charlotte Kiwanis club, of the Goodfellows Club, the Christian Men's Club and the Myers Park country club. He took a leading part in the civic work. Twice was he honored by the Kiwanis club by being elected a director, and as chairman of the stunt committee helped arrange some of the most attractive programs of the weekly club luncheons.

"William Edward Graham Robinson was born 43 years ago at Richmond, Va. His father and grandmother before him were textile manufacturers and he followed in their footsteps. Reared at Petersburg, Va., he pursued a textile course at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. In 1902 he moved to Concord, joining the Cannon textile interests, and came to Charlotte in 1916 to become associated with the Robinson Manufacturing company, headed by his father, William LaFayette Robinson. The name of this firm was later changed to the Robinson Spinning company, of which Mr. Robinson was vice president and manager at the time of his death."

In November, 1920, Mr. Robinson was married to Miss Mary Gaither, only daughter of Doctor Gaither, of China Grove.

REV. R. S. ARROWOOD TO COME TO MCKINNON CHURCH

Has Been Pastor of Greenwood Presbyterian Church at Greensboro.

Today's Greensboro News has the following of interest in Concord: "Rev. Robert S. Arrowood, pastor of Greenwood Presbyterian Church, has accepted a call from McKinnon Presbyterian Church, at Concord, it was announced yesterday, and a congregational meeting has been called for next Sunday to consider the resignation tendered by Mr. Arrowood."

"Since Mr. Arrowood has asked that the pastoral relationship be dissolved it is thought the church will concur with him in dissolving the same. It is desired to dissolve the relationship, although members of the church have expressed their regret at his decision to accept the call of the Concord congregation."

"There has been no intimation of the church's intention about calling another pastor, although it is understood that a committee has been appointed to suggest a new minister."
