MISS ALEXANDER GOES INTO THE RACE FOR GOVERNOR

Charlotte Woman to Make Campaign for the Office of Chief Executive.

Charlotte Observer. Miss Julia Alexander, representative from Mecklenburg county in the general assembly, yesterday announced that she had definitely determined to make the race for governor in the next campaign.

Although previous mentions had been made of her prospective candidacy and although she has had the idea in mind since early last year, yesterday was her first definite public commitment.

"Since the first newspaper mention of my prospective candidacy for governor in the next campaign," she said, "I have received so much assurance of support from people of prominence in political affairs that I shall certainly enter the race."

Having raised her standard on the political hilltop, she will make her campaign with positive assurance as to the outcome. In making the announcement, she said, "Such enthusiastic interest has been manifested in my candidacy by voters throughout the state that I feel confident of success."

When making the announcement she exhibited some of the letters she has received. Miss Alexander is the only woman representative in the general assembly in North Carolina, and she aspires to the higher political honors, she says, not because she is a woman, but with the motive of rendering service.

She feels that a woman's point of view on affairs affecting the whole state should not be materially different from the sound that of the male, political leaders who have long maintained a monopoly in the field.

Surviving him are two sisters, Mrs. Leon Detinger, Lexington, Ky., and Mrs. Claid A. Street, Winston-Salem, both of whom were with him when he died.

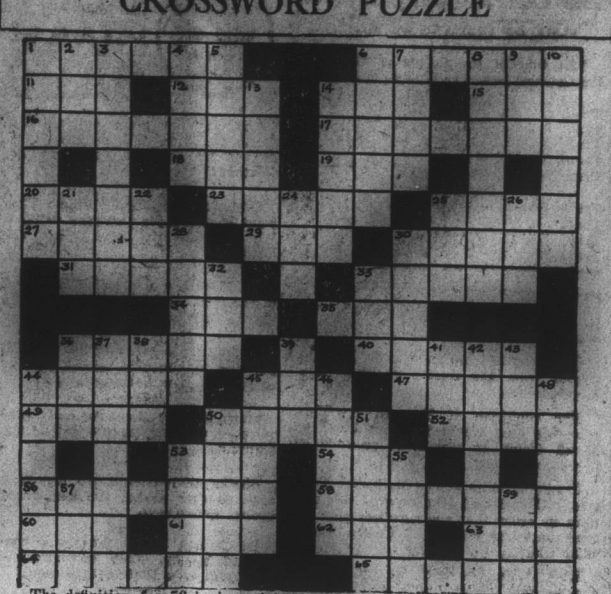
