Renew Pica For Universal Vaccination.
Raleigh, April 11.—Two hundred and fifty cases of smallpox reported in North Carolina last month caused State health officials to renew their plea for universal vaccination, said Dr. F. M. Register, of the bureau of vital statistics.

Dr. Register pointed out that only three countries, Switzerland, Russia and Greece, have a larger per centage of smallpox than the United States. He used as a basis of contention that this disease can be prevented the fact that last year there was not a single case of smallpox reported in Australia or New Zealand.

Dr. Register called attention to the fact that the cases which developed in the larger cities of the State are included in the totals for the counties in which these cities are located.

"I wish to urge all our people to become vaccinated who have not yet taken that precaution," said Dr. Register. "When this month's figures are in, they will doubtless show a spread of the disease to other counties.

"There have been no pronounced epidemics of smallpox, and there is no need to anticipate any such epidemic. Yet, smallpox can be prevented through vaccination. This is the only absolutely

safe course to pursue—to get vaccinated. I would that everybody would cooperate in stamping out this disease. It is a useless disease, in that it is a preventable disease."

Mrs. Coolidge Not Buying New Easter Apparel.
Washington, April 9.—The oft-vexing problem of what to wear on Easter apparently is not disturbing Mrs. Coolidge. The wife of the president has bought no new Easter frock or bonnet and plans to attend church services Sunday attired in a gown already in her wardrobe and a hat that has been used before.

Seldom a frock and hat for the day, it was said today, will be made at the last minute and will depend largely on the weather.

Water Used As Aerial.
Paris, April 11.—A novel form of aerial used recently by French naval operators consisted of a vertical column of water discharged from a nozzle. The results were satisfactory, the transmitted signals covering a radius of about eight miles.

North Carolina Has Champion Birth Rate.
Raleigh, April 10.—There were 86,496 babies born in North Carolina, the whole union's champion birth rate state, in 1924. This total was announced by the vital statistics department of the State board of health today.

The 1924 total exceeds that of 1923 by 2,906. In 1923 there were only 84,190 births reported.

Giving the figures by months, Dr. F. M. Register, of the vital statistics department, pointed out that December led all other months, with a total of 8,770. Its nearest competitor was June, with 7,808.

Dr. Register said physicians were growing less lax all the time in reporting births. In a test conducted by the vital statistics bureau of the federal census bureau, he added, North Carolina made a score of 92 on reporting births. This state is now in the federal registration area.

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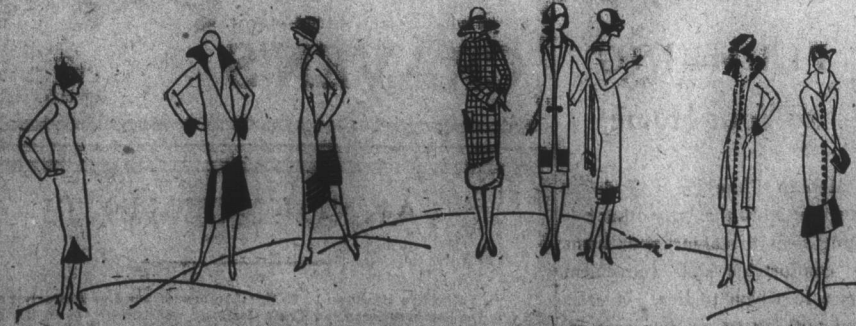
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
