History of the Kannapolis Presbyterian Church.

The Presbyterian Church was organized in 1900 with fourteen charter members. The first officers were A. J. Wine-cook, elder, and J. M. Goodnight, M. J. Archer, J. P. Whitley, deacons, Rev. L. H. Query was instrumental in organizing the church and supplied the church until Rev. T. B. Anderson was called as pastor. It was under his leadership that the first church building was erected at a cost of \$2,700 plus the lot which was donated by Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Cannon.

Following Mr. Anderson, the church has been served by the following pastors: Rev. J. W. Shipley, Rev. C. C. Myers, Rev. Neil Melnis and Rev. W. C. Jamison. On March 8th the congregation worshipped for the first time in the auditorium of the handsome new church building. They had been worshipping in the basement of the building since September 22nd, having moved from the old building before the new one was completed in order to give the school the use of the old building until the new high school building could be completed.

Mrs. R. Frank Flowe is president of the Woman's Auxiliary. Mr. H. A. Allred is superintendent of Sunday school, with Mr. H. D. McCorkle assistant superintendent and G. B. Brandon, general secretary of Sunday school. The enrollment of the Sunday school is at present 253 with an average attendance of over 200. The membership of the church is approximately 325.

Textile Situation and Outlook. Charlotte Observer. The Textile World makes report that new business is not being placed in large quantities on any class of cotton goods. Many mills, it says, have a satisfactory volume of orders for the next few months, however, though the situation continued rather spotty. Gingham and percales of well known mills continue to lag behind scheduled deliveries, indicating the extent of the improvement that has been made by these fabrics.

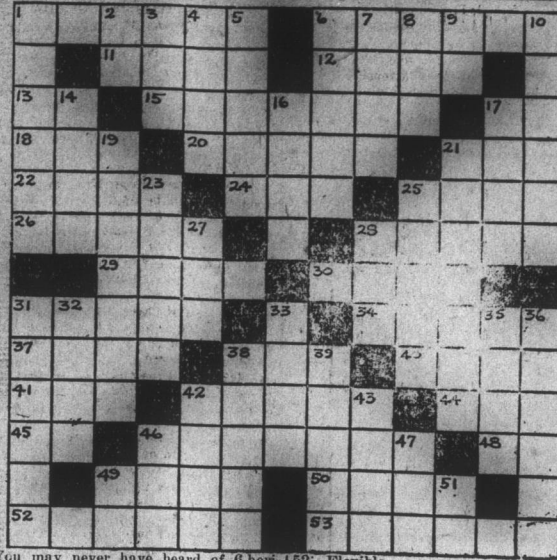
The primary influence on the goods market from now on until the end of the summer will be the development of the new cotton crop. It is fairly well established that a slightly larger acreage will be planted this year than last, but even another crop as large as that of 1924 should not cause cotton prices to go much below present quotations. Considerable interest has been displayed in the speech made by President Coolidge last Monday at a dinner of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers in Washington. The President's failure to refer specifically to the advance in duties advocated by some manufacturers on fine count unfinished goods has been generally interpreted as meaning that he does not favor action at this time.

Bergen Newton Injured In Accident. Bergen Newton, of this city, is in the Concord Hospital with a fractured skull as the result of an auto accident early this morning at the intersection of Kerr Street and Franklin Avenue, his condition being reported as serious during the day. According to reports to police officers Newton was injured when his Ford car and a Chevrolet by J. C. Canup met at the street intersection and Newton's car turned partially around and then lurched itself across the street. Canup was not injured, and his car was not badly damaged. Newton was rushed to the hospital immediately after the accident and his injury was diagnosed as a fracture of the skull.

Pastor Called. Last Sunday the West Concord Baptist Church extended a call to Rev. V. P. McCarter, of Gastonia, and he has accepted the call, and will preach there Wednesday night. He will also administer the ordinance of Baptism. The public is invited to this service. Mr. McCarter will move to Concord about the first of next week. CROSSWORD PUZZLE

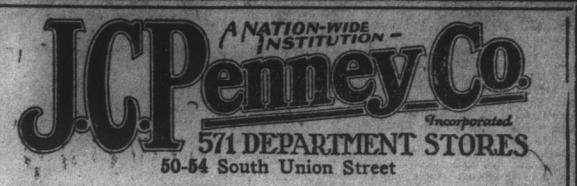

Snakes In Ireland. There are no snakes in Ireland. The lizard is the only reptile native in the country. The legend that St. Patrick expelled the snakes from Ireland is very old. The "Apostle of Ireland" lived in the fourth and fifth century. Traditions do not agree on the methods used by St. Patrick in his miracle of removing the snakes. One old writer says he accomplished the feat by beating a drum. He struck the drum so hard that he knocked a hole in it, thereby endangering the success of the miracle. But an angel arrived from heaven at the crucial moment and mended the drum. In the Gaelic mountains there is a place called Lough Dilveen. It is said that while banishing the snakes St. Patrick chained a monster serpent at Lough Dilveen and told him to remain there until Monday. Even to this day the peasants in the vicinity say the old serpent calls out every Monday morning: "It is a long Monday, St. Patrick." Another story says that one serpent caused St. Patrick considerable trouble. The saint then resorted to cunning. He made a box and invited the snake to enter it. The serpent objected on the ground that the box was too small. St. Patrick said it was large enough to be comfortable. So the argument continued until the snake finally got into the box to prove that it was too small. St. Patrick slammed down the lid and threw the box into the sea. The legend further says that the waves of this snake and that the noise of the surf is that of the serpent imploring for release. Tradition says St. Patrick banished the toads as well as the snakes. Two fighting planes collided a mile in the air at Kelly Field, San Antonio, Texas, recently. The pilots leaped, fell swiftly for hundreds of feet, opened their parachutes and floated down side by side to safety, while the two ships hit the earth with thundering crashes and burst into flames. 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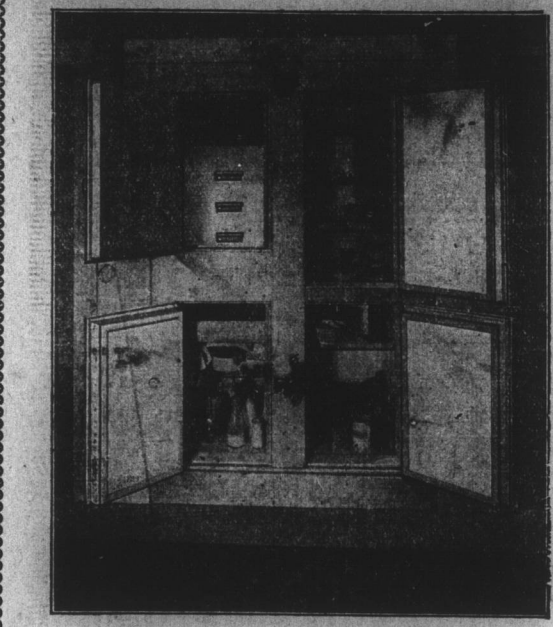


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
