PROMINENT PREACHER TO HOLD SERVICES NEXT WEEK

Dr. Burt Smith, Fish Secretary of Parish School Board, Here Next Wednesday.
Much interest is being shown in the coming of Rev. D. Burt Smith, D. D., Field Secretary of the Parish School Board of the United Lutheran Church in America. His coming will stimulate interest in the Sunday School work. He will conduct a series of conferences for four afternoons, beginning next Wednesday, April 29. These conferences will be conducted principally for officers and teachers, but will be helpful for all church workers. In the evenings he will give general addresses on the teaching function of the church. All of his conferences and lectures will be held in St. James Lutheran Church, but a special invitation is given to all Sunday School and church workers to attend. It is intended that his coming shall be profitable to as large number as possible. Dr. Smith will be pleasantly remembered from his visit and lectures during the City Institute some months ago. He travels from coast to coast in his work for the United Lutheran church. His wide connection with all phases of Sunday School work makes him an authority in his field of work.

W. E. Whitley, seventy-six years of age, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. I. P. Shankle, Thursday evening at 9:30 o'clock after an illness of only a few days, death being caused by pneumonia.
Funeral services will be conducted Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at Albemarle. Mr. Whitley was born in Stanly County in 1849, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Whitley. He lived in Albemarle during the greater part of his lifetime. He was a devoted member of Union Grove Baptist church.
Surviving are Walter Whitley, of Danville, Va., Braxton Whitley, of Albemarle and Mrs. I. P. Whitley, of Concord, children of Mr. Whitley. Three brothers survive, J. O. Whitley, Gooden Whitley and Jackson Whitley.

Death of David M. Black

David M. Black, prominent farmer of No. 10 township, died Thursday morning at the home of his son, W. L. Black, death being caused by cancer with which Mr. Black had suffered for several years. His condition had been so serious for some time that death was not unexpected.
Funeral services were held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at Bethel Church, conducted by Rev. Mr. Ballard, assisted by Rev. Mr. Williams.
Mr. Black was 74 years of age and was son of the late Lee and Polly McEachern Black. He was born and reared in the county, having spent all his life in Cabarrus. He was a member of Bethel Church for many years.
Surviving are the following seven children, his wife having died several years ago: F. B. and J. R. Black, of South Carolina; R. A. Black, of Charlotte, W. L. and A. E. Black, of No. 10 township; Mrs. B. C. Conner, of No. 10 township, and Mrs. Charles Barr, of Charlotte.

COLB MORRIS, LOCAL BOY, PRAISED BY EL PASO PAPER

Reserve Officers Say That His Conduct Is Worthy Of Emulation. Moves To Dallas.
Lieutenant W. Colb Morris, son of Z. A. Morris, of this city, who recently moved from El Paso where he was connected with the flying squadron, to Dallas, Texas, and has been praised very much for his work in El Paso.
The El Paso Herald speaks editorially of his work as follows:
"An officer who has done much to promote closer relationship and better understanding between El Paso civilians and the army is Lieutenant W. C. Morris.
"His done good work here; work that has been appreciated and will continue to be appreciated. That he is to leave El Paso is regretted deeply.
"Whenever Lieutenant Morris came, there was no organized reserve corps activity here, or practically none. He developed the reserve corps, got officers into it; promoted their understanding of that arm of the national defense, got them acquainted with each other; fostered fellow feeling and corps spirit, and developed the O. R. C., organization here until it now is one of the best in the United States.
"His has been a patriotic service well planned and excellently carried out."
The El Paso Reserve Officers Association sent Lieutenant Morris a letter in which they wrote as follows:
"It is not unusual for one of your calling to comply with all that could be expected of him in his professional duties and to gain the friendship of his associates. "And you, sir, permit us to state, that you have been just as active and have evidenced throughout just as much interest in all Reserve Officers, both in their individual problems and in the broader activities of the Association. Your example of military courtesy and your conduct both as an officer and among us as man to man might well be emulated."
"Your activities on your part and these qualities have gained for you the particular admiration and esteem of the Association and it is with much regret we learn you are soon to be transferred elsewhere."
Lieutenant Morris was greeted at Dallas by a large number of flyers and a luncheon was held in his honor by the flying club of that city. In speaking of the possibility of getting an air mail service for Dallas, Mr. Morris made the following remarks:
"The Dallas Flying Club has been largely responsible for the establishment of the airway office here," he said, "but what we are doing now is only a small part of the air service that will be in operation five years from now. If the city of Dallas and her business and civic organizations desire to receive mail service and are willing to provide necessary hangars for half a dozen ships or more with proper facilities for landing and taking off, I am confident it can be secured."
"The airway mail service of the army makes this city a divisional point now, the ships coming from San Antonio landing here for supplies and then proceeding to Muskogee, Kansas City, St. Louis and Chicago for connection with the New York-Frisco service at the latter place. In my opinion this is but the initial step toward the development of a regular mail route and also commercial aviation on a large scale."
