April 22.—Much of the purpheted livestock of the country is finding its way to the dinner table, in-stead of being kept on farms for breed-ing purposes only, the bureau of animal industry has found in a survey which reached 653 farmers in 45 startes. An-swers to questionnaires sent out by the bureau developed also that the dairy in-dustry is diawing many purched cat-ile.

Analysis of the replies, the bureau announced today, has shown that about 62 per cent of purchered livestock is mar-keted directly for meat purposes, swine being slaughtered at the rate of 75.1 per cent; sheep 62.6 per cent, and cattle 41.8 per cent.

The consensus of opinion of the farm-ers was that purched meat animals cost slightly less than scrubs to raise to ma-turity, while dairy cattle cost slightly more. Purchered animals were deelared and somewhat more so than graded stock, the degree depending on the proportion of purc blood passessed by the grades. 


