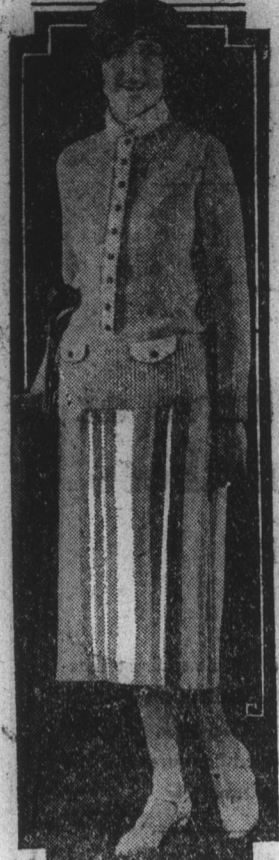

One class in practical nursing completed in Kannapolis and illustrated lecture given to class by Dr. S. E. Buchanan. Certificates issued to six.

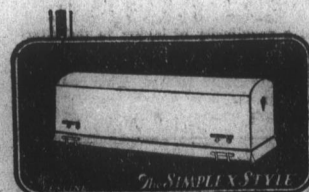
