

DEAF CHILD IN PLANE DROP

Fast Fall of 5,000 Feet Falls to Effect a Cure. Middletown, Conn., May 9.—Jeanne C. Moore, the five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard J. Moore, of this city, was strapped yesterday afternoon to an aviator who drove his plane 8,000 feet into the air and then dropped suddenly about 5,000 feet, in an endeavor to cure the child of congenital deafness. The little girl shrieked with terror. When taken from the plane it was found that the drastic treatment had apparent-

ly failed as a cure, for she could not hear her mother call to her. The experiment was tried upon the advice of a prominent ear specialist. Al Johnson, professional at the local country club, is getting everything in readiness for the golf tournament to be held here Thursday afternoon by the Concord, Salisbury and Winston-Salem teams. The Lexington club was asked to join in the tournament, but it is not known whether the invitation will be accepted. Play in the tournament will begin at 2 o'clock, and in addition to the club members the professionals of the three clubs will play on the local course during the afternoon.

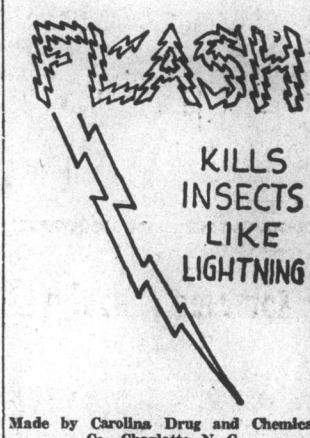

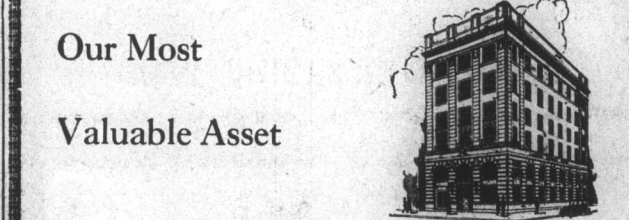
