TAX LISTERS IN COUNTY WILL CONTINUE WORK

Get Ruling From Attorney General Relative to Deduction of Fifty Per Cent. On Some Property.

Prof. J. W. B. Long, tax supervisor of Cabarrus county, has instructed tax listers of the county to continue the listing of taxes following a meeting held at the court house yesterday afternoon at which a ruling on the matter of making deductions on certain property was agreed on. The ruling came from Attorney General Brummitt and covers the matter of deducting taxes on homes on which mortgages are held, an amendment to the State constitution providing that in some instances the deduction shall be 50 per cent.

In his ruling the attorney general explained that homes on which building and loan associations hold mortgages are not to be subject to the deduction unless the associations actually list and pay taxes on the notes in question.

Mr. Long read to the listers present at the meeting the following letters, which it was agreed, straighten out the matter entirely:

Mr. J. W. B. Long, Tax Supervisor,
Concord, N. C.
Dear Mr. Long:

Replying to your letter of the 11th. I have to say that the deduction of fifty per cent. in accordance with the terms of the amendment is to be of the value of the note and mortgage. This may result in a queer situation some times, but I think that the amendment is clear on that point. I herewith send you copy of our ruling on the subject, from which you can no doubt work out most of your problems.

It should be borne in mind that the owner of the home cannot get the exemption unless the note is listed and taxes paid on fifty per cent. of it. As a practical matter, I think it would be well for the list-takers to take note of every claim of this kind presented by the owner of the home, getting all possible information, and then when he comes to make up his books, he will be in a position to determine whether the claim should be allowed.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of May 9th has been received and carefully noted. I am enclosing you herewith copy of the ruling of the attorney general, which will doubtless answer your question.

Ordinarily, building and loan associations do not list and pay taxes on notes and mortgages held by such association, and unless the building and loan association does actually list and pay tax on the note in question, the borrower could not properly take credit for 50 per cent. of the value of the note.
