Three Day Conference at Statesville Brought to Close Las: Night.

Statesville, May 16.—Today, the last of the three-day conference of the General Synod of the Associate Reformed to the transaction of business. The conference has been attended by about 300 delegates, representing churches in ten Southern States, and reports from every section indicate very gratifying progress in every phase of church activity. The work today was featured by the consideration of the budget committee's report, the adoption of which brought on much discussion particularly in regard to home missions and to the future program of Bryson College at Fayetteville, Tenn. The appeal for aid for the con-

tinuance of the Associate Reformed church at Russellville, Arkansas, was granted by the synod the sum of \$5,000 over and above the \$15,000 for church extension itemized in the budget committee's report being granted. Other appropriations included the following:

To Erskine College, Due West, S. C., \$15,000 of which \$5,000 is to be raised by special contributions; to Bryson College, Fayetteville, Tenn., \$5,000 for the continuation of the work there; to Woman's College, Due West, S. C., \$55,000.




