### STATE FIREMEN WILL MEET IN ASHEVILLE

**Annual Meeting to Be Held This Year** During Week of July 13th.—Making Plans For Convention.

Announcement was made here today by John I. Miller, secretary of the State Firemen's Association, that the association's annual convention will be held this year in Asheville during the week of July 13th, with Thursday of that week to be open for the races.

The date of the convention was selected at a conference held in Asheville by Frank W. Bennett, of Durham, president of the association; Mr. Miller and representatives of the Asheville Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Miller states that the Battery Park Hotel has been selected as headquarters and it is estimated that between 400 and 500 firemen and guests will attend. The organization has members in 106 cities and towns in the state with a total membership of around 3,500.

The tournament and races are expected to attract wide attention, Mr. Miller added, and elaborate plans are being made in Asheville for the entertainment of the visitors attending the convention.

**Play to Be Presented in Mt. Pleasant Monday.**

**Carolina Playmakers to Be Given \$13,000.**

New York, May 19.—Trustees of the Carnegie corporation today voted sums totaling \$300,500, to support organizations carrying on experiments or demonstrations in the fine arts, including music. This is the first time the corporation has entered this field to any great extent. Among the larger grants were: \$50,000 as an endowment fund for Grinnell college, Grinnell, Iowa; \$50,000 as an endowment fund for Hampton institute, Hampton, Va.; the income to be used for instruction in industrial arts; \$50,000 as an endowment fund for Tuskegee institute, Tuskegee, Ala., for instruction in applied arts, and \$50,000 as an endowment fund for Wellesley college, Wellesley, Mass., for support of the department of fine arts.

Other organizations to which funds were allocated include the North Carolina Playmakers, \$13,000 for support of their dramatic activities.

**Mrs. Presley Dead.**

Mrs. Phranie L. Presley, aged 26, died at her home at the Brown Mill at 6:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon after an illness of one week; death being due to blood poisoning. Funeral services will be held at Mill Creek Church Wednesday, at 11 o'clock, burial being made in Mill Creek cemetery.

Mrs. Presley was born in Union county. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Buchanan. Surviving her are her parents, her husband and one brother, Mrs. Presley's only child, a baby, died on May 12 of this year.

**Gives Check For Chimes Fund.**

The War Mothers have been presented with a check for \$50 for use in their fund which they are raising to place chimes in the city. The money was given by Martin L. Cannon, of Charlotte.

For several years it has been the aim of the War Mothers to install chimes in a suitable tower in Concord and they have been doing a great deal of work toward this end.
