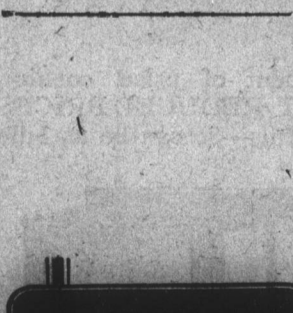
Pocket Placed In Front
