HOBBART UPJOHN CHOSEN AS NEW CHURCH ARCHITECT

New York Firm to Design First Presbyterian Church—Structure to be Pure Colonial.

Announcement was made yesterday at the morning services of the First Presbyterian Church that the contract for the drawing of the plans and specifications for the new church, which is to be constructed on North Union street on the old Martin Cannon property, had been let to the Hobart Upjohn Company, architects, of New York city.

It was also announced at this time that the amount of \$150,000, set as the aim for subscriptions in the campaign, had been subscribed in full.

The Hobart Upjohn Company is considered one of the leading church architectural firms in the country. Two of the churches which have been designed in North Carolina by this firm are the James Sprunt Memorial Church at Chapel Hill and the new Chapel at Pinehurst.

The church will be of pure Colonial architecture, with a tall spire. Church and Sunday School, equipped, will be large enough to accommodate a membership of from 800 to 1,000.

Not included in the \$150,000 subscribed is the organ which "will be taken care of in a handsome way by Mrs. J. W. Cannon," according to Dr. J. C. Rowan, pastor of the church. "Neither does this include the cost of a magnificent set of chimes to be given as a memorial to their parents by Mrs. Nan Cannon Stringfellow and J. A. Cannon. It does include the memorial pews which have been given as a memorial to her mother by Mrs. R. S. Young. It also includes taking care in a fitting way of the other memorials now in the church," said Dr. Rowan.

DEATH HERE SUNDAY OF MRS. M. F. HUMPHREY

Robeson County Woman Died Here of Heart Trouble at Home of Her Son, J. A. Humphrey.

Mrs. M. F. Humphrey, aged 70 years, died here yesterday at the home of her son, J. A. Humphrey, on Young Street, death being caused by heart trouble with which she had suffered for several years. The body was taken to her late home in Robeson county Sunday, the funeral party having left the city in automobiles shortly after noon.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at Mt. Tabor Presbyterian Church, Robeson county, conducted by Rev. J. I. Humphrey. Interment was made in the cemetery of the church.

Mrs. Humphrey was born and reared in Robeson county, but had been visiting her son here for some time. She was a daughter of the late Levi Hayes and had been a member of the Baptist Church for many years.

Surviving are the following sons: J. J. Humphrey, of Robeson county; J. A. Humphrey, of Concord; W. E. Humphrey, of Lexington; R. F. Humphrey, of Leaksville, and C. E. Humphrey, of Monroe.

GIBSON WINS TENTH GAME TRUNCING SOUTHSIDE MILLS

Watts Home Run in Ninth Gives Locals a 2-1 Decision in Best Game of the Season.

Saturday's game was the best on record at the Gibson Mill. With the score standing Southside Mills 1—Gibson 0 at the last half of the ninth inning and with pinch hitter Young safely perched on first, Watts, a Cross Roads product, took a swing at the first ball Cline threw him, sending it far over center-field fence, thus breaking up as neat a game of ball as has ever been dished up on the local lot.

Up to the time when Watts made his circuit clout winning the game for Gibson 2-1, it had been a pitchers battle between Cline and Simmons with Cline having the edge on the Wake Forest collegian. During the first eight innings, Cline had permitted opposing batters to garner only three safeties. Sid Basinger accounting for two of these and pitcher Simmons for the other.

Simmons himself had not been hit hard, having yielded some six safeties. He kept them so well scattered, however, that the home run by Boggs in the 5th frame was the only score made against him. On several occasions he was in bad holes but extricated himself with considerable ease.

Persons who had looked for Gibson to have a poorer team than they did before Kannapolis made the selective draft of her players were disappointed. If anything, the team Saturday was superior to the former one. Sid Basinger showed in his selection of players that he was by no means a bad baseball scout.

Chief among his acquisitions was Harrill, who held down first base. This youth, State College first baseman next year, scintillated time and again in brilliant plays. On one occasion he made what nearer approached a flying tackle than anything else to stop a grounder down the first base line, which had all the earmarks of a two bagger on it. Another time, he raced to right field to pull down what seemed a sure hit, catching the ball while he had his back to it.

Haynes, on short-stop also did some classy playing and it was Watts who finally won the game. Sid Basinger, of the old guard, also played brilliantly, leading his teammates in hitting and performing his customary snappy stops of all grounders in his vicinity. He displayed a pretty piece of strategy in the ninth when he staked every thing on the ability of Young and Watts to hit.

Young had showed all sorts of hitting ability in practice before the game and although he was not in the regular line-up, Sid put him in as first batter in the ninth. He singled and scored when Watts did his stuff.

Bradley, for the visitors, did some pretty playing despite the fact that he made one error. In hitting Castevens led. The entire team played well, showing more real baseball than any other team that has visited the lot this season.

The game Saturday made the tenth consecutive victory for Gibson. Southside had only been defeated twice previously in fourteen starts.

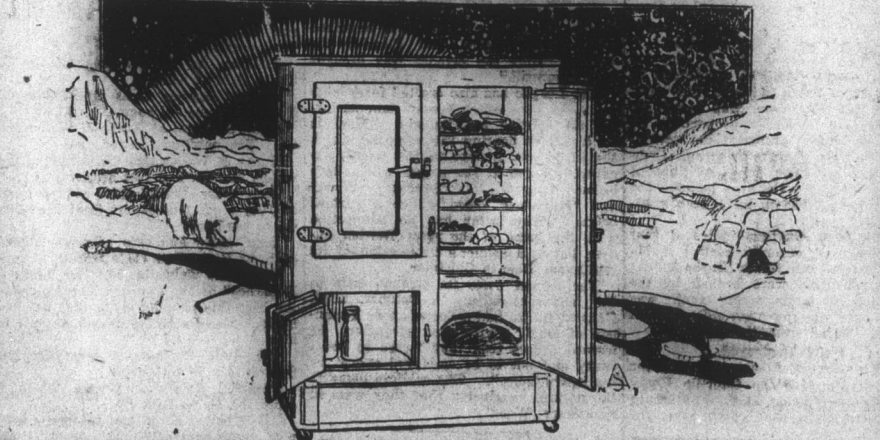
