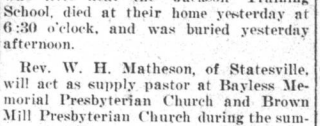

DECLARES MR. MELLON VIOLATED LIQUOR LAW Chauncey Hackett Makes Sensational Statements in Speech in Paris. Paris, June 29.—Chauncey Hackett, general counsel of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment, of Washington, D. C., was the chief speaker at the sixth congress of international anti-prohibition organizations, France, Austria, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Spain, Finland, Holland, Hungary, Italy, Portugal, Great Britain, Sweden, Switzerland and Norway were represented in addition to the United States. Mr. Hackett's description of the operation—"on-operation," he called it—of the American dry law amused the delegates of the various nations assembled. "Prohibition does not exist in America," he declared, "or rather, it does not function. It has changed social customs, but not lessened social drinking. The officials themselves do not obey it. Even the present secretary of the treasury, charged with the enforcement of prohibition, is obliged, in order to serve wine on his table, to violate the law, which he has done either personally or through agents, by buying cellars of Washingtonians who, under the law, are

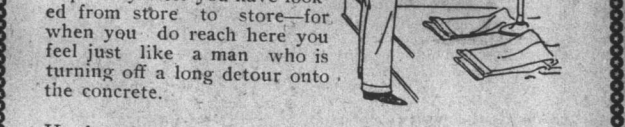
