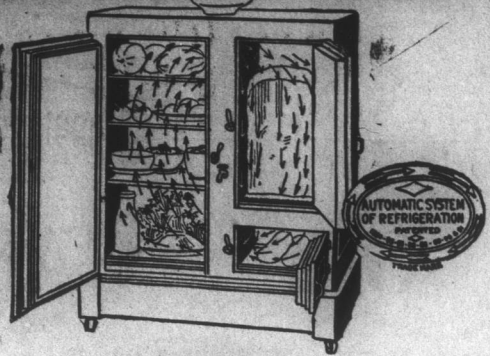

The county commissioners will meet at the court house Monday for their regular July meeting. So far as is known now no matters of unusual interest will be presented to the board.

The condition of J. W. Denny's sister, who was operated on for appendicitis, continues to be very serious. Mr. Denny has gone to Winston-Salem to be with her.

I. T. Hartsell, one of the most prominent members of the Concord bar, has been elected vice president of the North Carolina Bar Association. His election was made at the sessions of the association being held this week in Asheville.

Defendants tried in police court Friday afternoon paid fines and costs totaling \$35.95. One person was fined for driving by the "stop" sign at the square. The heaviest fine was \$15, paid by a defendant charged with gambling.

Rev. and Mrs. W. C. Lyerly and family have moved into the house on West Corbin street which was formerly occupied by Mrs. L. P. Davis. This home will be used temporarily as the Reformed Church parsonage.

According to reports here D. F. Widenhouse, prohibition agent, aided in the seizure of two autos and 103 gallons of whiskey during the week. The seizures were made in the western part of the state by Mr. Widenhouse and two other federal agents.

The public continued Friday, despite the excessive heat, to clamor for new license tags, a total of 252 being disposed of during the day for a total amount of \$3,680. The rush was continuing today, a long line of persons awaiting their turn throughout the morning.

According to a deed filed Friday G. D. Grimes and R. M. Cline have sold to J. A. Hawkins property in this county for \$615, and another deed records the sale of property in Midland by P. J. Hartsell and J. B. Green to John C. Sossamon for \$1 and other valuable considerations.

The hot weather continues with increased fury. Friday was probably a little hotter than Thursday and during the early part of Friday night there was little relief from the torrid temperatures. Rain is badly needed again, not only as a means of breaking the hot spell but to freshen growing crops.

Negro Found Dead in Woods Near Raleigh.

Raleigh, July 3.—Walter Snipes, negro carpenter, believed to have carried big sums of money, was found dead yesterday afternoon in Oberlin woods, several miles from Raleigh.

Death at the hands of somebody "to the jurors unknown" was the verdict of Coroner Waring's jury. The dead man was found after his body had been several days in the woods. His pockets had been turned inside out and there were other evidences of robbery. He worked for a local contractor.
